The 2018 edition of Kingdom of Heaven Fair was successfully held last October 21, a Sunday, from 1 pm to 5 pm at the Parish Social Hall. To recall, the Kingdom of Heaven Fair, also known as 'Holyween' was first mounted in 2016 as the Catholic foil to the vampires, witches, zombies, monsters, devils, slasherhorror villains, and vampire themes that pervade the 'traditional' Halloween celebration. Displaying great



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Last October, I accompanied some pilgrims to the Holy Land. The itinerary included the baptismal site along the Jordan River, mount of temptation, Jericho,



Caesarea Philippi, Capernaum, Nazareth, Cana, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Dead Sea, and Samaria.

The highlight of the pilgrimage was the visit to the Church of the Sepulchre in Jerusalem and the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. These two sites always have the longest lines. It took us 3 hours in line at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre before we could enter the tomb of Jesus and 2 hours in the Church of the Nativity before we could touch the birth spot of our Lord, located right below the altar of the Church.

A silver star marks the exact spot of Christ's birthplace. Two staircases (entrance and exit) descend a few feet into the site where pilgrims kneel and kiss the birth spot. The spot has a Latin text 'Hic De Virgine Maria Jesus Christus Natus Est' which means 'Here Jesus Christ was born to the Virgin Mary'.

'Born to the Virgin Mary.' With this statement, I suddenly realized that the Virgin Mary can guide us in our Advent preparation. While John the Baptist was officially appointed to prepare for the coming of the Messiah, Mary has done the most immediate preparation - offering her womb as the first home of the baby Jesus for his first nine months on earth, finding a place to give birth to the child, taking him to safety when Herod ordered all babies two years and below to be killed, bringing him to the temple, finding him there when he got lost and doing all her motherly duties to the baby such as feeding him, clothing him, cleaning him, making sure he grows up safe and healthy.

Advent Preparations

Every year, the liturgical calendar of the Church begins with the season of Advent. Advent is a preparation for Christmas, beginning four Sundays before Christmas and ending on Christmas eve.

Advent comes from the Latin word 'adventus', which means 'coming'. The

coming of Christ is understood in two senses. first, Christmas is a remembrance of the first coming of Christ - his coming in the flesh, when he was born in a manger in the town of Bethlehem, 2000 years ago; a celebration of God becoming a human being in the person of his only son, Jesus Christ. Second, Advent is a time when our 'minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time' (Ordo).

Christmas has a more festive character. The Philippines is regarded as celebrating the longest Christmas. When the 'ber' months begin (September to December), Christmas decor and songs start to appear in the malls. Thus, the Advent season is characterized by parties, shopping, gift giving, raffles, games and houses brightened up by Christmas lights, lanterns and trees.

Originally though, Advent was a period of fasting to accompany repentance and prayer leading to Christmas. The Council of Tours (567AD) instructed monks to fast daily in the month of December. Advent was referred to as a 'little Lent' for its similarity with Lenten fast and penitence. As it evolved, fasting would cease being a requirement for Advent but the component of repentance was retained. The sober Advent became a joyful preparation for Christmas.

Mary and Advent

How can Mary guide us in our Advent preparation?

- Mary invites us **to prepare a room for the Lord Jesus**. She urges all of us to look inward and allow Jesus, as he was born in the her womb, to be born in our hearts.
- She invites us to repentance and sanctification. Mary was immaculately conceived because God wants to prepare a clean womb for the baby Jesus. Christ's coming must also clean and purify our heart. His grace must melt and cleanse our hearts that have been hardened by hatred, unforgiveness, and evil.
- She invites us to commit ourselves to our Lord. She gave all her being when she said yes to God's invitation to become the mother of His Son. 'I am the handmaid of the Lord. Be it done to me according to your word.' With that, God's plan and purpose took over her mind and heart.
- She invites us to rejoice and be grateful. When Elizabeth exclaimed how blessed she is among women for being chosen as the mother of God, Mary burst into praise and thanksgiving, 'My soul magnifies the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my savior,

- for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant.' She is thankful for what the Lord has done to her. As a Stewardship parish, we should remember that the very basis of our spirituality is gratitude for all the wondrous things and blessings that come from Him. Look around and count your blessings, your family, your work, your daily sustenance. Thank God daily.
- She invites us to be generous. By saying yes to God, she shared all of herself. Her very person was at God's disposal, totally cooperating with God's grand plan of salvation. What can we give back to God as an offering when everything we have belongs to him? What are we willing to give of ourselves so that God can fulfill his plan for us? May our generosity build lives and bring a smile to other people especially the poor.
- Lastly, Mary invites us to **pray**. After the shepherds told her about the amazing things the angels told them about the baby Jesus, we are told that 'Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.' (Luke 2:19) At some point, we need to pause. Spend some time in prayer and just be in God's presence reflecting about our life.

Below is Saint John Paul II's prayer to the Blessed Virgin during Advent:

May the Virgin Mary help us to open the doors of our hearts to Christ, Redeemer of man and of history; may she teach us to be humble, because God looks upon the lowly; may she enable us to grow in understanding the value of prayer, of inner silence, of listening to God's Word; may she spur us to seek God's will deeply and sincerely, even when this upsets our plans; may she encourage us while we wait for the Lord, sharing our time and energies with those in need.Mother of God, Virgin of expectation, grant that the God-who-comes will find us ready to receive the abundance of his mercy. May Mary Most Holy, 'Woman of the Eucharist' and Virgin of Advent, prepare us all to joyfully welcome Christ's coming and to celebrate worthily his sacramental presence in the mystery of the Eucharist.

Completing Advent Season and Simbang Gabi; Christmas Season Begins

Advent officially began at the 6 pm mass on December 1, the first Sunday of Advent. The mass was marked by the blessing of the Advent Wreath as well as the Prayer and Lighting of the 1st Advent Candle, led by the Leongson family, nominated by the Altar Servers Liturgical Ministry. For the rest of the December 1-2 weekend, the lighting of the Advent Candle were done by: Diwanihan Kristiyano's Cruz family; LeCom Liturgical Ministry's dela Llana family; Christian Family Movement's Cruz family: EMHC's Tecson family: Mustard Seed Ministry's Dangel family; Knights of Columbus' Tan family; Couples for Christ's Uson family; LeCom Liturgical Ministry's Reyes' family, and Worship Ministry's Alivarvar family.

Succeeding masses on all the succeeding Sundays of Advent - 2nd Sunday last December 8-9, 3rd Sunday last

December 15-16, and the 4th and last Sunday of Advent on December 22-23 - were similarly marked by Prayer and Lighting of the Advent Candle by specified families, but without the initial blessing. The villages also had their own Advent masses and their own Advent candles for lighting.

As explained by Fr. Steve Advent is the four weeks

of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. The Advent season offers the opportunity for parishioners to share in the ancient longing for the coming of the Messiah. With each week as his Advent, or "coming," draws nearer, another candle is lit, with each candle dispelling the darkness a little more. Thus, the Advent wreath helps to spiritually contemplate the great drama of salvation history that surrounds the birth of God Incarnate who comes to redeem mankind. After the 6 pm December 1 mass, Fr. Steve officiated the blessing and lighting of the CTK Christmas Tree.

There is a lot of symbolism in the four candles of the wreath:

The 1st Sunday of Advent symbolizes ۲ Hope with the "Prophet's Candle" reminding us that Jesus is coming.

- ▶ The 2nd Sunday of Advent symbolizes Faith with the "Bethlehem Candle" reminding the faithful of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.
- ▶ The 3rd Sunday of Advent, also called Gaudete Sunday, symbolizes Joy with the "Shepherd's Candle", a reminder of the loy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus.
- ▶ The 4th Sunday of Advent symbolizes Peace with the "Angel's Candle", a reminder to the faithful of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."

Simbang Gabi, the long-treasured Philippine tradition of dawn masses for nine consecutive days, or novena, before Christmas Day, started last Saturday, December 15 with the 8 pm Misa Aguinaldo. It is one of the longest and

most important religious celebrations in the Philippines that has lasted over 600 years. In the Spanish times, the masses were celebrated very early, usually at 4 in the morning, since they took place during the harvest season, when farmers had to be in the fields at the crack of dawn. At the first sound of dawn, at the crowing of the rooster, the entire family would get up and walk to the nearest parish church. The novena culminated on the ninth day, December 24, with the Mass of the Gifts, or Misa de Gallo - 'gallo' means rooster, in Spanish - which celebrates the birth of Jesus.

As before, CTK had two sets of Simbang Gabi, the pre-dawn masses at 5 am, which replaced the usual 6:00 am daily morning mass, from December 16 to 24, and the evening masses at 8 pm, from December 15 to 23. The evening Simbang Gabi presiders and offerors included:

Philippine Catholic Church Declares 2019 as Year of the Youth

Discernment.' The year-long celebration, which will start on the first Sunday of Advent on Dec. 2, will carry the theme 'Filipino Youth in Mission: Beloved, Gifted, Empowered.' This follows the past 12 months celebration of the Year of the Clergy and Consecrated Persons. The Episcopal Commission on Youth of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines, or CBCP, said that the 'Year of Youth 2019 will officially kick off with the feast of Christ the King, November 25, 2018, but the solemn opening ceremony will be held on December 2. The Diocese of Cubao launched the Year of the Youth at the Immaculate Conception Cathedral with a celebration of Diocesan Youth Day last December 1, starting with a Holy Mass at 7 am followed by a parade at the Cathedral School grounds.

Its observance, which the CBCP described as part of the 'nine-year journey for New Evangelization', will end on Nov. 24, 2019, the 2019 Feast of Christ the King. It will be recalled that in 2013, the bishops' conference launched a 'nine-year journey' to 2021, the fifth centenary of the arrival of Christianity in the Philippines, with a different theme

Filipino soil was celebrated in Limasawa Island on Easter Sunday on March 31, 1521, and the first Filipino Christians were Humabon and Hara Amihan, who were baptized Carlos and Juana, respectively. The Spanish missionaries brought the Christian faith to the Philippines 500 years ago and today the nation is home to Asia's largest Catholic population. Out of 110 million inhabitants, 80% are Catholics.

'We look forward with gratitude and joy to March 16, 2021, the fifth centenary of the coming of Christianity to our beloved land,' the Philippine bishops had written in a 2012 pastoral letter, ahead of the 9-year preparation. The first five years were dedicated to 'integral faith formation' (2013), the laity (2014), the poor (2015), the Eucharist and Family (2016), and the 'parish as a communion of communities' (2017). The year 2018 was dedicated to the clergy and consecrated persons, while the remaining two years of the preparation will be dedicated to ecumenism and inter-religious dialogue in 2020 and 'bringing the Gospel to all people', in 2021.

Activities next year are aimed at 'youth in formation, youth in communities, church and society, youth in mission, and youth ministry and youth ministers.' The 'Year of the Youth' observance comes after the Synod of Bishops on young people last month. The final document of the meeting stressed the concrete aspects of the lives of the youth, the role of schools and parishes and the need for the laity to be trained to accompany young people.

The CBCP stated, 'As with the two disciples of Emmaus [cf. Lk 24:13-35], Jesus constantly and faithfully accompanies young people in the journey of life. We as Church in the Philippines are called to take the same stance with our youth: journeying with them, listening to their doubts and dreams, inviting them to conversion and communion, and raising them up in mission to enlighten and inflame the



Spirit, offered as a gift [cf. Jn 20:22; Acts 2:38; Rom 5:5] to each of the baptized. The blue hand, carrying the human figure in a supporting and presenting gesture, symbolizes how young people are loved by the Father; this same love is mirrored by the Church. This blue image can also be seen as a footprint, signifying movement for a purpose and making a mark.

The dove in red, being received by and hovering over the human figure, signifies the Holy

Filipino youth are beloved by God and His Church, especially through her youth ministry, who raise them up and carry them lovingly through life, with all its trials and tribulations. When it didn't seem like it, they would ask the priest to sprinkle holy water again. There were even a few who dragged the priests by the sleeve to a specific crypt to bless the

I'm in awe of your spirit of service and how very little of politics, personal agenda, and conflicts manifest themselves in the way you do God's business in the parish.

I have told the bishop many times – there is very little for me to do here. The parish almost runs by itself, things get done, plans get executed, personal point should not be forgotten – that all of where we are now, the quality of our office staff, the quality of our parish pastoral council, the exceptional support and teamwork by the various ministries, liturgical groups, and mandated organizations and renewal movements which support our social and developmental services, the high quality of our infrastructure and facilities – they were all the result of thirty five years of dedicated work by the parish priests who have come before me.

I recognize the early start-up efforts of Fr. Victorio Lanuevo and Bishop Antonio Tobias. They were saying mass in White Plains, all the while that they were planning to build a new church along Greenmeadows Avenue. Much of the credit though goes to Msgr. Jaime Mora. His two decades as parish priest of CTK Greenmeadows and his systematic execution of a grand vision for the organization of the ministries and the physical infrastructure in those 20 years created the backbone on which nearly everything we see and do now have been built upon.

Even the short stint by Bishop Ongtioco enabled the parish to pause and reflect and arrive at another audacious goal to be truly a stewardship parish, with members, parishioners and servant leaders who would be men for others, giving much of their time, talent, and treasure in the service of Jesus' mission. On top of those strong foundations, we had six years of Msgr. Dan Sta Maria. who created a strong culture of transparency. This was followed by six years of Fr. Bong Tupino who instituted process excellence and emphasized liturgical celebrations. During their terms, both Msgr. Dan and Fr. Bong reinforced the values of servant leadership, strengthened the parish organizations and how the various groups work together, and got back to the basics of formation, fellowship, evangelization, and being a real church for the poor.

And now it's my turn. I stand on the shoulders of the parish priests who have come before me. I am so blessed and lucky that Fr. Lanuevo, Bishop Tobias, Bishop Ongtioco, Msgr. Sta Maria and Fr. Tupino have paved the way. I can only wish and pray that I will leave CTK, in 2024, an even better parish than when I arrived in July 2018.

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Catechetical Ministry Organizes Kumpilang Bayan

painted graphic of Christ the King, the type of image you could easily 'google'. In the early 2000s, the parish used a stylized sketch of the church itself, trying to capture the circular footprint as well as the rising roofline and the carillon tower at the back of the church. Even now, that same imagery is used in our screensaver inside the church.

Sometime 2005, CTK also used photos of the giant standing statue at the altar - in fact, if you visited the CTK website a month ago, you would still have seen the altar image on the home page. Somewhere along the way, an escudo or shield was also designed, consisting of several elements - crown, dove, fleur de lis, three circles, etc. This 'coat of arms' was being used in our FB page but nowhere else. Then when the Willy Layug statue was commissioned by Fr. Bong and installed in the front garden, CTK began to use its image for some of its communications, especially the Herald and the liturgical schedules. But with all these representations, CTK lacked the one consistent logo or symbol of the parish that the priests, staff, and PPC officers and members could use in all the communications. CTK needed a logo that would immediately establish the parish identity and which every ministry, mandated organization, and renewal movement could use, without fear of violating our identity standards.

When consulted, Fr. Steve Zabala said he wanted an identity with a simplified look, using at least one of the several elements of Christ as King. It could use the crown, a symbol of honor, power and kingly reign. Or even a scepter or royal staff, to symbolize authority. Or even a throne, to symbolize the sovereignty, power, dominion and authority of a king.

But Fr. Steve also argued that we also had to make sure the new logo was a familiar image. The image of Christ the King at our church altar didn't have a throne or scepter. The Layug scupture has a scepter but no throne. But was common in all the images in our parish was a crown. The next question was but what kind of crown? Fr. Steve wanted simple, dignified, at the same time a modern rendering so as not to turn off the millennials. And what about the text? Perhaps in gold and silver, symbols of kingly wealth.

So digital marketing expert Sheryl Coronel and her Alfa Fusion team came up with a number of studies. After several late nights and iterations later, the official Christ the King Parish Greenmeadows logo was finally approved by Fr. Steve and unveiled at the Parish Fiesta Fellowship.

The logo was announced the very next day at the electronic slide show at the steps of the main church. Within a week, the logo was also adopted for the website homepage, for the Herald newsletter, for the printed tarp bulletin board, and for the Stewardship Committee's refrigerator magnet giveaway. Plans are also underway to replace the stock parish envelopes and stationery once existing stocks are used up.



Turning 83 and Still Going Strong: Monsignor Morti Celebrates Birthday with Fellow Cubao Priests

Monsignor Tony Mortillero celebrated his 83rd birthday last November 13 with fellow priests, PPC members and close parishioners after the 6 pm concelebrated mass at the Divine Mercy Chapel. Actually, Msgr. Morti's birthday was last November 5 but due to scheduling conflicts, the celebration was moved a week later.



Their first answer was – bully. But having answered that, they also quickly remembered that at the same time, he was caring and had a soft heart. For example, he would knock at door of the young priests' rooms, for example, to ask them to have breakfast with him. As Vicar General, he would personally visit a priest who did not show up for the

priests' assembly to see if the priest was sick or needed assistance.

Msgr. Dan continued. 'The second word that came to the diocese priests' minds was – impatient. But just as quickly, they'd remember that when we were just beginning the diocese of Cubao, he would

frank. One time, I sang in public and he later accosted me to say that my singing voice is better hidden.' Msgr. Dan also mentioned that Msgr. Morti's homilies are brief, but they are always meaty. And that he loved expensive Spanish cuisine. Fr. Steve, who is probably the best at imitating Msgr. Morti's gruff voice, also shared his own funny anecdotes that had his fellow priests in stitches.

Msgr. Mortillero has been in the priesthood for an unbelievable 54 years, having been ordained on the 23rd of December 1962. His very first assignment was as Assistant Parish Priest in Pateros, Marikina, He then became the parish priest of Sta. Rita de Cascia Parish in Baclaran, Parañaque in 1971, and concurrently, Director of the Sta. Rita de Cascia Parochial School. He occupied the position for 22 years until 1993. From 1994 to 2012, or a total of 18 years, Msgr. Morti was assigned as parish priest of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in QC Project 8. In 2004, Msgr. Antonio Mortillero was concurrently appointed the second Vicar General and Moderator Curiae of the Cubao Diocese. He retired in 2012.

CTK PPC Sponsors Four Young Parishioners to Life Directions Workshop

A total of 22 participants, four of whom were sponsored by Christ the King Parish Greenmeadows' Vocation Ministry, headed by Louie Laudico and Anna Lagman, graduated last September 30 from the Life Directions Retreat Weekend of Fr. Ted Gonzales. their phones on Saturday morning and got them back only on Saturday late afternoon before the final mass. 'So that we can really take in everything, we had to **disconnect to connect**,' explained Althea.



The Life's Directions Retreat, a three-day semi-silent retreat held in Karis, Tagaytay, single young professionals and gathers assists them to reconnect with God, the idea being that amidst the hustle and bustle of life, it is always helpful to occasionally stop and reflect on the journey of life, the relationships formed, the crossroads encountered, and how to better cultivate a deeper relationship with God who created us. Participants are helped by the service team and the organizing committee to understand their strengths, weaknesses, values and world views. These facilitators have gone through the program themselves and come back to help out every weekend with the participants' life journeys.

By way of opening the retreat, Fr. Ted, who had already spoken several times at CTK's past formation talks, addressed the participants, 'Think of Life's Directions not as a weekend retreat but as a support organization, a mentoring program, and a free counseling service all rolled into one'.

Batch 108 that joined the Life Directions Weekend last September 28-30 at the Karis Retreat House in Tagaytay included Althea Geronilla, CTK's Youth Ministry Coordinator; John Juat, CTK's Altar Servers' coordinator; Lupo Basilio of PREX Youth and newly-commissioned lector-commentator; and Francis Vidanes, also form PREX Youth.

Althea recounted that they had to turn in

Lupo Basilio recounted his own reflection. 'Before the weekend, I felt truly lost and unsettled about many things. I was worried whether I would find a stable job that I actually enjoy, what the future holds for me, and so many other external factors that I have no control over. The retreat was a good balance between silent time and group sharing, which I found very helpful. The ambience of the retreat house was very welcoming and relaxing, the entire compound had a very uplifting atmosphere.' Lupo added, 'I really enjoyed interacting with other people and listening to their stories. I realized a lot of things about life and about being a human being.' When asked if he would recommend the retreat, he said, 'I recommend this Karis Retreat weekend especially for college students, college graduates, and young professionals.'

The Retreat has been going on for more than 20 years. Fr. Ted explained, 'It's a weekend filled with self-discovery, where the participants can locate themselves in the 'map of life', identify where the crossroads are, and most importantly, find ways to enrich their relationship with God amid the daily struggles.' He added, 'Going away for the weekend and away from daily routine forces our participants to just be there in the moment and be there with God.'



Stewardship Talk Enjoins Parish to Follow Jesus with Maturity

Fr. Ari Dy, President of Xavier School, was the guest speaker for the Stewardship Committee's quarterly formation talk held last September 22. It forms part of the committee's continuing Spirituality of Stewardship series and in celebration of the 13th year anniversary of 'Stewardship as a Way of Life' in the CTK parish. Fr. Dy's talk, conducted from 10 am to 12 noon at the Divine Mercy Chapel, was entitled 'Good to Great: Following Jesus with Maturity'.

Fr. Dy started with the premise that everyone in the room were on the path of essential Christian discipleship, that is, private prayer and private integrity as habits; exercising charity and justice, working for the survival of the weakest and the gentlest; involvement within an ecclesial community; and forgiveness and mellowness of heart. But the difficult part is to move from essential discipleship to 'mature discipleship'.

of God.' Peter's words are a paradigm for maturity and sustained commitment. Anyone who has ever been in a commitment for a long time, be it marriage, religious vocation, or some service to the community, knows that there are days and seasons when you'd like to walk away - except you are smart enough to know that, in the long run, the commitment brings you life! One of the major trials in mature discipleship is that of fidelity, of remaining steadfast and loving within our commitments over the long haul, after our initial emotional fervor has waned and some disillusionment has set in.

3.To walk as both 'Son of David' and as 'Lord' inside the regions of Tyre and Sidon. At a certain point in his ministry, Jesus leaves the Jewish regions within which he is preaching and withdraws to the notoriously pagan region of Tyre and Sidon. There he is approached by a Syro-Phoenician



Fr. Ari invited the participants to look at six invitations that come to us in the Gospels, namely:

- 1.To look for Christ on the way to Emmaus. In our journey of discipleship, we will be discouraged and tempted to walk away towards some place of consolation, say, Emmaus, but on that road, Christ will appear in a new guise. Initially we will not recognize him, but in that encounter, Jesus will restructure our imagination and our faith and we will recognize Christ anew, in a much deeper way; and that recognition will turn us away from Emmaus, the place of consolation, and back to our dream of faith and our church, our Jerusalem.
- 2.To remain committed, like Peter, when everything in us suggests that we walk away. When Jesus said, 'For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever." Many of his disciples who were listening didn't understand and no longer accompanied him. Jesus then said to the Twelve, "Do you also want to leave?" Simon Peter answered him, 'Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One

woman replies, 'Lord, even the dogs eat the scraps

that fall from the master's table.' Upon Fr. Ari Dy with CTK's Stewardship Committee hearing this, Jesus says to her: 'What faith you have!' And he heals her daughter. The woman pleads with him twice, first as Son of David, the Jewish Messiah, the identity Jesus had up until then embraced. She then addresses him as Lord, calling him to a wider loyalty by appealing to another identity that Jesus also carries. She appeals to him as God's universal instrument of salvation for everyone, those prepared and those not.

4.To look frantically for the lost coin.

Biblical compassion demands that we never be content for as long as some of our members are separated from us. Jesus teaches this all the time, as in the parable of the lost coin. We can reframe the story and say that the woman had ten children. Nine of them were okay and had a good relationship with her, but one was estranged, the so-called black sheep. The mother never stopped trying to reconcile with that one child the black sheep, and after many attempts they are finally reconciled. The woman is so happy that despite being of modest means, she throws a big party to celebrate the wholeness of her family. We are compassionate as God is compassionate only when, like Jesus, we remain in tears for those 'other sheep that are not of the fold,' and like the woman and her ten coins, we go out and turn everything upside down until we restore the wholeness that has been lost.

- 5.To live the baptism of Jesus and not just of John. John is in prison and can hear the party going on where the daughter of Herodias is entertaining the crowd. John will soon be beheaded, but he doesn't seem troubled by it. He might as well die, he feels, because he is only half a man and half a prophet. John is aware of both his strength and his impotence. He can point out what's wrong and what needs to be done, but after that he is helpless, with nothing to offer in terms of the strength needed to correct the wrong. He can call people to repentance, but that is all. John's is a baptism of repentance, a realization of what we are doing wrong and a resolution to correct our bad behavior. The baptism of Jesus is entry into grace and community so that we can do what is impossible by will power alone. Too often, we are already adults but we still try to live our lives by John's baptism alone.
- 6.To wait in the Upper Room with other disciples. At the end of Luke's Gospel, before he departs this earth, Jesus tells his followers to return to the city and not to leave until they feel themselves clothed with power from on high. In the Upper Room, we find a formerly confident bunch of apostles, now confused and out of energy, needing to be recharged, unsure of what they were waiting for, but waiting nonetheless for something new to happen to them, for new fire, for new vision, for a new energy from beyond. This can describe us too. Waiting is an act of hope, for the promise to be fulfilled.



Accepting the six invitations in your adult years allows you to live a less self-centered life. Mature discipleship is about expanding your perspective, your love, your patience and perseverance, and your compassion. It is about integrating divided loyalties, grace, and human nature. It is finding God in all things and finding faith in community.

The talk received very favorable feedback from the participants. 'The talk was inspiring, useful, and insightful', said one listener. 'The Bible readings used were explained in a different light, giving me new information and insights', said another. A third said, 'Fr. Dy's points were very useful for people at mid-life - instructive and inspiring in a comforting kind of way'.

Fr. Serge Maniba Shows The Way to Become Effective Proclaimers of the Word

The LeCom Liturgical Ministry's last General Assembly was held last October 20, at 10 am.

The first part of the assembly was conducted by Mel Novales, Leila Banico and Trix Deleña who alternated in introducing the newly-inducted LeComs, discussing the remainder of the 2018 liturgical calendar, reviewing the requirements for the November 18









commissioning, as well as conducting a post-mortem on the recent 'retraining', conducted by the mass and village coordinators. The invocation and opening prayer were delivered by Rissa Kawpeng.

'Those who accept my commandments and obey them are the ones who love me. And because they love me, my Father will love them. And I will love them and reveal myself to each of them.' John 14:28

This passage from the gospel of John opened the talk of former CTK guest priest Fr. Serge Maniba during his address at the LeCom General Assembly entitled, 'Becoming More Effective Proclaimers of the Word'. He stated that during the Eucharist, we behold Jesus come alive as 'word made flesh' on the 'table of the Word', which is the lectern, and the table of the Eucharist, which is the altar. He said that since the 'Word' has the power to attract people and transform their lives, the proclamation of the Word by a lector to the believers becomes the most beautiful job! In light of this, he encouraged the LeCom group to study the bible, know God's Word, love it, and be inspired by it. He proposed that when a lector effectively proclaims

the Word, he participates in saving souls because he brings to the believer the Mystery of God - that He dwells in our hearts and that we have a fellowship with Him.

Fr. Serge suggested that the lectors also read Verbum Domini, a post-synodal apostolic exhortation issued by Pope Benedict XVI which deals with how the Catholic Church should approach the Bible, the Word of God. Recognizing that a person's encounter with the Word is actually an encounter with Jesus, it emphasizes the proclamation of the Word as a parish priority. It is not only the listening believer who benefits.

When a lector allows the Word to affect his own spirituality and prayer life, he develops a life with depth and he allows the Word to bring him closer to sainthood and fullness of life!

He cautioned, the group, however into believing that life in Jesus will be free from suffering. He points to an image of our God who bears a cross, implying that the process of conversion can be a painful one as God needs to break through our hard-heartedness to transform us. Paraphrasing from Pope Benedict's book, Fr. Serge says that tears, like water, soften the ground of our being, helping the seed of the Word to grow and take root in us until we become the flesh of Jesus in the world.

In conclusion, he reminded the lectors and commentators that they can discern the extent of their transformation by observing the fruits of the Holy Spirit in their lives. (Galatians 5)



Fr. James McTavish Expounds on Same Sex Attraction and Homosexuality

Fr. James McTavish FMVD of Verbum Dei, CTK's regular facilitator for the School of the Word every Wednesday morning, was the speaker during the Living Hope Prayer Community's talk last November 13 on 'Love and Same Sex Attraction: Understanding the View of the Catholic Church'. Although Living Hope is not one of the recognized renewal movements of CTK, the group holds regular meetings at CTK, including its weekly Timothy Youth Ministry, and includes among their leaders Sonny and Mina Mejia, CTK's Mustard Seed Ministry lead couple.



Fr. James began by stating that the Catechism of the Catholic Church defined homosexuality as the relations between men or between women who experience

an exclusive or predominant sexual attraction towards persons of the same s e x. H e th e n expounded on three key points:

1. First, that current perceptions of the prevalence of homosexuality in society are way overblown. To prove it, he asked the audience they what thought was the ratio o f homosexual, gay, bisexual and transgender

people compared to the general population. A few said 10% while the majority said 20% or 25%. In fact, he showed the 2014 study by the Center for Disease Control, or CDC, which revealed only 3% of the US population identified themselves in a private survey as being in the gaylesbian-bisexual group. And what was the cause of the great disparity, he asked the crowd. It's the media and it's the assertiveness of this tiny community with their lobby groups that make them seem much larger than their actual headcount. Watch any noontime show or afternoon variety show on TV, he said, and chances are, you have gay hosts, interviewing gay guests, holding Ms. Gay Philippines and similar crossdressing competitions. Our media is 'super-saturated' with gay people, argued Fr. James.

2. Second, admittedly, given the onslaught of social media, youth today can be conflicted as to their sexuality. In a study of American youth, over one fourth of 12 year olds were unsure if they were heterosexual or homosexual. Why the ambivalence, he asked. The evidence for genetic disposition is scant, Fr. James argued, while the evidence for the role of 'environment' and 'nurture' is strong. Of course, there will be boys who are more artistic, creative, with poorer motor skills and unfortunately, society will already pre-label them as potentially gay. Aside from prevalent

media, you have - poor relationship with fathers and-or mothers; sexual abuse by an older homosexual male: labeling by peers, parents, teachers, etc. during their formative childhood period. This usually results in difficulty in bonding with same sex friends that further aggravates the situation. He also argued that sexual orientation is about feeling and feelings can change. For example, a boy can have a temporary infatuation with an inspiring male teacher, but that doesn't mean he's homosexual. So asking young people to 'come out' because they think they might be gay when in fact, only 3% of the population are indeed homosexual means that 97% of the time, you will be wrong.

3. And third, there is a insidious 'ideology of gender' that keeps attempting to put gender identity and sexual orientation front and center, when in fact, gender identity and sexual orientation are but one aspect, not even an essential aspect of a person's humanity. No one should ever be introduced as gay or homosexual. First, a person is a child of God. Then he or she's a parent and-or a child; then he or she's a student, or teacher, or priest, or office worker, or laborer. The person can be defined by his physical sex, his height, his skin color, his racial heritage, his IQ, his sociability, and many other things. Cardinal Ratzinger himself reminds us that

'the human person, made in the image and likeness of God, can hardly be adequately described by referencing his sexual orientation.' Fr. James argued that it is only today where a person can be a male genetically, anatomically, physically, physiologically - yet one piece of data can override all that information. And that's the person's feelings – 'I don't feel male, I feel female'. Fr. James asked everyone, 'Can that one feeling override all the other data?' He struck the analogy of the child telling his parent that he feels he's superman. Would that parent allow her child to climb up to the roof and jump, just because he 'felt' he could fly?

What does the Catholic Church say?

First, the sexual orientation is not in itself sinful. But engaging in the homosexual act is. Why? When a homosexual male is promiscuous and engages with several partners, it can only bring him harm. The typical number of partners by a sexually active homosexual male is 700, based on a recent survey. This can't possibly

be healthy, with the risk of sexuallytransmitted disease like syphilis, gonorrhea, and HIV. Fr. James once gathered a group of gay men and asked them, 'If a man and a woman can fall in love, get married, and stay in love till their old age, can't the same thing happen between two men who 'fall in love and stay in love'. The reaction from the group surprised him,

he confessed. The group said in one voice, Father, we have never ever met a faithful gay man.'

Second, in the words of Pope Francis in his book 'The Joy of Love', 'denying the difference between a man and a woman and envisioning a society without sexual differences is contrary to the anthropological basis of the family.' In the same book, Pope Francis said, 'Same sex unions, for example, may not simply be equated to marriage.' The CBCP weighed in similarly. 'Males and females are meant to complement each other in a union of the two. And human sexuality, characterized as distinctly masculine or feminine, is ordered by nature towards that union, of one specifically with the other.'

Fr. James also sought to correct the misimpression about an often-used quote from Pope Francis. What's in the popular literature is 'Who am I to judge?' Actually, Fr. James clarified, the whole and correct sentence was, 'If a person is gay and seeks God and has good will, who am I to judge him?' Which gives a different meaning and tone to what he was trying to say.

In terms of prescriptions, Fr. James offered several.

 Prayer – praying for people with same sex attraction and they praying for direction - was number one.
Prayer, argued Fr. James, can keep the mighty force of human sexuality under control. He quotes Scripture, 'Do not fall into the grip of your passion. Fierce passion destroys its

owner'.

2.He also argued strongly for continuing formation, especially for those with same sex attraction. He cited the COURAGE apostolate, which was formed for persons with same sex attraction trying to be chaste, with the help of the community, while ENCOURAGE was created for parents with children having same sex attraction.

3.He encouraged young men and women with same sex attraction to

develop healthy non-sexual friendships – and to create strict lines and boundaries.

4. Lastly, he strongly advised to avoid discriminating against persons with same sex attraction. They must be accepted with respect, compassion and sensitivity. Even the Catechism of the Catholic Church had strong views on the subject – 'Every sign of unjust discrimination in their regard should be avoided (CCC 2358)'.

E M H C s Encouraged to Model After

Fr. Steve Zabala was the invited speaker by the EMHC liturgical ministry headed by Albert Cuadrante at their monthly October Formation Talk last October 18. Fr. Steve talked on 'In Pursuit of Happiness: Imitating Mary', a timely talk considering it was the Month of the Rosary.



Fr. Steve talked about man's holiness. Man has been invited by God to be holy. 'You must therefore be holy, for I am holy (Lev 11:44). God has established his relationship with man. 'I will be your God, you will be my people.' God differentiates between his children and other people. 'I am the Lord your God; I have separated you from the



peoples.' (Lev. 20) And God clearly shows the way to holiness: 'Whoever claims to live in him must live as Jesus did.'

On Mary, Fr. Steve especially highlighted her virtues: obedience to God, not questioning why her; selflessness; fidelity to the Son, staying with him and supporting him till his death and resurrection; fidelity to the Church; and being prayerful.

Nearly a hundred senior citizens showed up, mostly from so clients can attain their goals. The couple does one-on-one coaching, group coaching, as well as give talks and workshops. The focus of the assembly was on 'Keys to Healthy Aging', which included talks by Dr. Willie and Mae Lagdameo, head couple of Health & Wellness Coaches Phils., on healthy eating, the value of supplements, the need for sound sleep, and several other topics on aging gracefully. The talk was subtitled: 'Add Years to Your Life and Life to Your Years'.

'Coach' Willie Lagdameo is a pediatric surgeon with UST, Cardinal Santos and Medical City and a Dr. Sears certified health coach while 'coach' May Lagdameo is a certified integrative nutrition health coach as well as a holistic cancer wellness coach, and a stress management coach. Both Lagdameos have survived cancer and spent 2003 to 2013 in the US with the Institute for Health Nutrition and Dr. Sears Welness Institute. As health coaches, they help clients set goals, track and review progress, share knowledge and solutions, and motivate and inspire



- production of aging proteins, weakened immune systems, telomeres getting shorter, and hormones becoming helpless. Physical issues manifest themselves in inflammation, which then results in cancer, gut problems, heart

disease, stroke, alzheimer's, diabetes, and arthritis. As we grow old and more aging proteins are produced due to excess blood sugar, sludge accumulates throughout our blood vessels resulting in hardening of face and skin wrinkles.

They went into their four 'pillars of health', that is, l i v i n g correctly, m o v i n g correctly, th i n k i n g correctly, and

the arteries, Bon Intengan lead the seniors into Laughter Yoga routines



eating correctly, using the acronym LEAN, for lifestyle, exercise, attitude, and nutrition. For lifestyle, they advocated getting a good night's sleep since it increases nitric oxide production which dilates arteries, delivers blood flow, and optimizes blood pressure. The lack of sleep, which increases tiredness, also increases appetite by 25%. For exercise, they asserted that the best exercise is the one you will do and keep doing. So the advice is - start low and go low; keep it safe; and make it fun. The Lagdameos argued that moving instead of sitting results in much less risk of Alzheimer's, improved vision and gum health, healthier skin, stronger and healthier heart, as well as good joint and gut health. The exercise routine should include strength training, endurance or cardio, and flexibility or stretching. They then asked the senior audience to join them in doing cross-arms and side bends.

Regarding attitude, it's all about not having negative thoughts. Their advice: begin each day with a grateful heart. They also argued that the company you keep has a lot to do with the state of your


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Stewardship Committee Releases 'Attractive' Refrigerator Magnets as End-of-Year Gift for Current and Future Stewards

The Stewardship Committee, through heads Benjie and Wins Mirasol, released their end-of-2018 refrigerator magnet give-aways to their regular Stewardship donors and to the PPC members during the First Advent Sunday masses. The cute magnets, a set of four and squarish

in shape, are reminders of 'Stewardship as a Way of Life'. They replace the desktop calendar that the Committee had always given away at the end of the year.

For December 2018, the Committee wanted to give more people than the usual number because of the realization that СТК i s



composed not just of the people who serve and who are seen regularly to participate in the various liturgical as well as community building activities organized in the parish but also includes the hundreds of families who regularly or occasionally attend the ten Saturday & Sunday masses and who may not even live in the nearby villages but farther, some as far as Antipolo and Marikina. There are also regular weekday morning and evening massgoers, on their way to work or on their way home from the office, who also do not live in the villages designated as part of the CTK GM parish.

Thus the Committee members thought that perhaps on one weekend in December, the Committee can give all these families of massgoers the annual token gift, which had traditionally been the CTK stewardship calendar. For the past few years, the Stewardship Committee has been giving calendars for the following year either at Christmas time or early at the start of the year, as a token of appreciation to parishioners who serve in the various ministries and organizations of the parish. The calendar features photos of the past year's activities of the ministries and organizations, some stewardship

messages, and bible verses on stewardship.

But producing five or ten times more calendars than usual would be prohibitively expensive. Besides,

the Stewardship Committee noticed that for the last two years, they had so many

Committee that many people today use their phone and laptop calendars. Besides, calendars also are the usual Christmas corporate giveaways. Putting the committee members' heads together, they agreed on small refrigerator magnets with stewardship bible verses. After all, they argued, family members go to the refrigerator often in one day. The ref door is also used in varied ways: a place for your reminders, short messages to each other, emergency telephone numbers, delivery hotlines, cute family photos for cheering up, the report card with a star or an "A", mementos of your travels, other favorite magnets, etc.

The four bible verses for the four magnets to describe the characteristics of a good steward were nominated by Angel Viloria, a committee member, and the floral background and text typeface and layout designed by Angel's daughter Ali. The project was presented for review to Fr Steve Zabala and the media and finance heads of the PPC to get their blessings. Each of the four magnets will remind the owner that:

• A good steward is grateful for all the blessings he receives from the Lord. The basis of Stewardship is gratitude. Everything comes from God.

Give thanks to the Lord for He is good; His love endures forever. (Corinthians 16:34)

- A good steward is responsible for everything that God has blessed him with. One must use those blessings prudently, also making sure that they are not wasted or diminished from lack of use. Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men. (Colossians 3:23)
- A good steward is generous, joyfully sharing all his blessings with justice and love. He knows that it is better to give than to receive. Freely you have received, freely give. (Matthew 10:8)
- A good steward gives back to the Lord with increase, because the Lord can never be outdone in generosity and He knows what's best for each one of us. One day we have to stand in accountability before the judgment seat of God. And God will ask: What did you do with all the time that you had? What did you do with all the gifts I gave you? What did you do with your life? From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded. (Luke 12:48)

Wins added, 'We hope that everytime a recipient opens what some call the 'door to happiness', he or she is reminded how blessed he or she is, and that God wants he or she to bless others too!'

Related to the Stewardship Committee, Benjie and Wins announced the Search for CTK Stewards of the Year. At the last November PPC meeting last November 10. Benjie and Wins announced the draft rules for the Stewardship Recognition Program, the main objectives of which are to recognize members who exemplify stewardship traits and to highlight the message that CTK is a Stewardship Parish.

The organizers are also thinking that the annual search becomes a regular source of witnessing stories for future stewardship articles and videos. Every ministry, mandated organization and renewal movement will be encouraged to identify a member who best exemplifies the ideals of gratitude, responsibility, giving back and generosity, with more emphasis on 'time' and 'talent' vis-a-vis 'treasure'.

Fr. Harold Parilla Focuses on Spiritual Maturity for Advent Recollection

Fr. Harold Anthony S. Parilla was the leader for CTK's Advent Recollection last Saturday, November 17 from 10 am to 12 noon at the Divine Mercy Chapel. Encouraged by the good feedback



received from his CTK Lenten recollection last March, Formation Ministry Head David Ong requested him lead the Advent Recollection.

The topic for Fr. Harold's Advent recollection was 'Spiritual Maturity'. Fr. Harold defined spiritual growth, which should be the objective of all Christians, as the process of becoming more mature in one's relationship with Jesus Christ. Someone who is growing spiritually will love God more.

Fr. Harold began with the parable of the rich young man (Mark 10:17-31, Matthew 19:16-30, Luke 18:18-30) who ran up and knelt before Jesus Christ and asked him, 'Good Teacher, what must I do

Disheartened by the saying, he went away sorrowful, for he had great possessions. It's a parable about growth, Fr. Harold explained. We should not be content with just being good; our love for

God must be strong enough to transform our goodness into greatness. In the case of the rich man, though he followed the commandments, a part of him was distracted by maintaining, enjoying, and growing his worldly posessions. Fr. Harold maintained that when you love God 90% of the time, the 10% gap keeps us sad deep inside.

He then discussed the important elements necessary to keep us moving on the road to spiritual maturity.

First, is knowing and accepting ourselves, or self-knowledge and self-understanding. In today's world, there is competition and pressure to perform and succeed and prove ourselves. But then we lay ourselves open to self-doubt and self-rejection if we fail. So, at the core of a strong spiritual life is the conviction that we are God's beloved. And here, Fr. Harold told the story of inspirational speaker and You Tube sensation Lizzie Velasquez, afflicted at birth with an extremely rare congenital d i s e a s e called Marfanoidprogeroid-lipodystrophy syndrome

to inherit eternal life?' You know the commandments: 'Do not murder, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Teacher, all these I have kept from my youth.' And Jesus, looking at him, loved him, and said to him, 'You lack one thing: go, sell all that you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me.' that, among other symptoms, preventing her from accumulating body fat and gaining weight and meriting her the dubious distinction of the ugliest person on the planet. But despite this, Lizzie never doubted herself and believed in God's love for her.

 Second is gratitude. Fr. Harold observed that everyone complains but very few are thankful. Contributing to a perpetual sense of ingratitude are envy of others, overfamiliarity with our own strengths, virtues and skills to the point of ignoring them, and a sense of entitlement, that what we have we



deserved anyway so why be thankful. He therefore suggested that the best antidote for ingratitude, and the resulting depression that arises, was to keep a 'gratitude' journal, where we write down every little thing each day that happened to us for which we should be grateful. We would be surprised at the number of entries that we would make if we only paid attention. He brought up the story of the blind beggar who had a sign 'I'm blind. Please help.' The beggar received a few coins but was disappointed, until a smart man wrote another sign at the back which said 'It's a beautiful day and I can't see it.' The blind man received so much more donations because it forced the reader to appreciate the gift of sight that the beggar didn't.

Thirdly, the sense of personal vocation. God not only gives but calls as well. We all need to look at our work as a response to God's call and a willing participation in his plan for us. So spiritual growth must include a sense of vocation and life purpose.

- Fourth, a reflective and discerning heart. Growth is about looking within and asking, 'Where to, Lord'.
- Fifth is self-transcendence. It's going beyond personal needs, requests, wishes and aspirations are, to where you can make a contribution and sacrifice for others.
- And the sixth element for spiritual maturity, is the ability to celebrate,



CTK Greenmeadows Gawad Kalinga Project Celebrates 9th Foundation Day

Fr. Steve Zabala led the CTK delegation, consisting of BEC Coordinator Eileen de Leon, Acropolis liturgical and BEC coordinator Maan del Rosario, Media Ministry co-head Bing del Rosario, and Catechetical Ministry co-head Alma Yeh, in visiting the CTK Greenmeadows Gawad Kalinga village in San Diego Street, off Zabarte Avenue, Barangay Kaligayahan, Novaliches during their Foundation Day last November 30 on the 9th anniversary of the village founding in 2009. Also with the party were Benjie and Wins Mirasol, Stewardship Committee head couple and original project in-charge for the GK project.




And as in years past, Christ the King Parish Greenmeadows again demonstrated its continuing support for the GK village flagship project it underwrote and jointly sponsored with Couples for Christ-Gawad Kalinga for the 50 former resident families of Libis Sitio 1, the area under the Santolan-Katipunan overpass and the first of several Libis sitios to be evicted. Unlike most other GK villages, this CTK Greenmeadows GK village was donated not by one corporation but by several hundred parishioners, parishioner families, CTK chapters of mandated organizations and renewal movements.

The 50-unit village is spread out over 3,000 sq.m. Benjie Mirasol was the project manager for the site search and housing construction in 2008-2009 under then-parish priest Monsignor Dan Sta. Maria. Libis Sitio 1 was already nearing forced evacuation and the 50 families, including CTK staffers Noel Miro (Sacristan Mayor), Dodong Cabintoy (driver-gardener), and Rey Llagas (parking area maintenance) had nowhere to go. As with other GK sites, beneficiary families had to undergo training and orientation on community building as well as values formation initiated by Couples for Christ before they could get custody of the houses. In turn, the CTK donor-sponsors committed to spot livelihood opportunities so that the beneficiaries and their children could become valuable assets to their new parish. Since 2009, Benjie and Wins, in tandem with the Couples for Christ North team, had also been taking care of the spiritual needs of the villagers and ensuring that the Couples for Christ-GK ideals and value systems are internalized by the relocated families. From being marginalized, the project beneficiaries have become productive community members with transformed attitudes, life outlook, and spirituality through the formation programs of the Couples for Christ-CTK Chapter. But even after eight years, the village elders continue to regularly consult their 'godparents' on many different matters - financial, conflict resolution, moral concerns, employment issues, village leadership questions, etc.

The CTK delegation met with the village leadership team, consisting of president Tony Gallardo (who had been president since 2009), Juliet Mendoza (treasurer), Fred Figueras (Peace and Order incharge), Emiliana 'Baby' Paz (Environment and Safety in-charge), and Marietta 'Neneng' Torres (Visitors' Welcoming Committee in-charge) to discuss village history, early problems and solutions, faith-centered initiatives by CFC and CTK, village management, and community relations for the first hour. A very dynamic exchange ensued. Bing del Rosario had insisted previously that the CTK GM GK village was the first real example of BEC ever organized by the CTK parish, hence it merited a





serious look by BEC officers Eileen de Leon, Maan del Rosario and the other BEC coordinators, as well as by Fr. Steve.

After the huddle in the air-conditioned Meralco Sibol school building, the Foundation Day cum Christmas Party program began, emceed by Bing del Rosario who interspersed games with the prepared musical performances. Game prizes were given away by the team of Wins Mirasol, Eileen de Leon, Maan del Rosario and Alma Yeh. Fr. Steve gave a message midway into the program and then unscriptedly launched into a Sampaguita song medley that had the senior citizens swaying and on their feet. This merited loud applause at the end of the number. At 12 noon, the village lunch followed.

Moving Forward on the Road to Spiritual Maturity no matter the outcome. Fr. Harold encouraged us to build the capacity for hoping, trusting and surrendering.

As with previous recollections, Fr. Harold required that the attendees spend 15 minutes in quiet and contemplative mood to reflect and pray. He gave everyone the guide questions to reflect on:

- When you hear the words 'spiritual maturity', what do you sense in yourself – growth or regression?
- In which element do you find resonance, or the lack of it?
- What do you hear in the prayer as the Lord's invitation?

In his talk, Fr. Gilbert explained the origin of Advent and its relevance to the Catholic faith. He structured it so that reflections and sharing were based on the meanings of the four candles of Advent, namely:

- Candle 1, for hope or 'pagasa'. The faithful hope on the promise of God to send a Savior and hope on the promise of Christ to come back again. The reflection question was: 'Ano ang mabubuti mong pangako sa buhay? Nasaan ka na sa mga pangakong ito?'
- Candle 2, for faith or 'pananampalata'. Fr. Gilbert enjoined the kasambahays to pay attention to God whispers and to read the Bible to understand his Word. He also explained that the sacraments are the pathways for blessings. The reflection question: 'Kumusta ang ating paglalakbay sa pananampalataya?'
- Candle 3, for joy or 'ligaya'. The blessing received should be passed on so we can experience joy without end. Fr. Gilbert's reflection question: 'Maligaya ka ba? Anong biyaya ang maipapasa mo sa kapwa?'
- Candle 4, for peace or 'kapayapaan'. Sins produce noise and stains to our soul, which is why we are often not at peace. Fr. Gilbert expounded on the effects of sin and the peace one experiences in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. His reflection question: Examine your conscience in preparation for confession.

mind set. So the advice is - surround vourself with positive influences and enjoy life with them. On nutrition, the straight advice from Willie and May was - get off the sugar rollercoaster. Why? Because sugar highs are always followed by crashes which result in a craving once again for sugar, and the cycle goes on. The couple advocate for 'traffic light' eating, that is, classify food into green or 'go', yellow or 'slow down', and red or 'stop and think'. Red light foods, or foods that speed up aging, are those that are high in man-made fat and hydrogenated oils, low in fiber, highly processed, and contains artificial flavors, colors, and preservatives. This includes packaged food and fast foods. As for food



supplements, ordinarily, man should get by on regular food. But due to commercial farming practices wherein plants are treated with chemicals and raised in soil with depleted nutrients, we tend to lack nutrients that lead to illness. Hence the value of specific food supplements.

In addition, a talk on 'Health Insurance for Seniors' was given by a sales representative from Maxicare Prima. The one year Gold card, available for approximately P12,000 entitles senior holders to unlimited consultation at MyHealth Clinics with internal medicine, OB-GYN, ENT, derma and optha physicians; plus unlimited CBC, urinalysis, lipid studies, glucose, chest xray, and ultrasound lab procedures. Once a year, the card holder is also entitled to prophylaxis and panoramic full-mouth xray.

Making a return trip to the Seniors' Assembly was Bon Intengan, who gave comic relief as well as physical activity with his Laughter Yoga routines. Bon had done a similar intermission number during the August 25 assembly.

Aside from serving a morning merienda, the Sunrise Ministry heads also served lunch. The participants all left with umbrellas for the rainy day as their 'loot' after the productive morning.

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CWL Visits Camp Karingal Ladies Dorm 'PDLs'

The Catholic Women's League of Christ the King Parish conducted their annual outreach in the Ladies Dormitory of Camp Karingal last October 19. The organization has been visiting and conducting this annual outreach for the past 20 years, serving the spiritual and immediate material needs of the dormitory's 'persons deprived of liberty', or PDLs.

The Mother Butler Mission Guild Manila to which the MBMG CTK belongs held an exhibit of vestments, stoles, altar linens, vessels, mass kits, and sick call kits last November 5 and November 6 at the San Carlos Seminary in Guadalupe. The exhibit was timed to coincide with the seminary homecoming, with the materials on display to be given for free to 'homecomers' coming from the poor parishes in the Philippines, especially provincial ones.



MBMG also set up a table ten days later, from November 15 to 17 at San Jose Seminary inside the Ateneo de Manila University compound in Loyola. As with San Carlos Seminary, San Jose alumni priests coming from poor parishes can request for, and are given, the church and mass materials. Aside from giving away free mass and church materials, MBMG receives requests via mail and e-mail

from the provincial parishes where the parish priests, having heard of the MBMG apostolate, request for the materials and where they have the stock and the request deemed meritorious, the goods are sent free via courier.

MBMG production of vestments, stoles and altar linens takes place the whole year non-stop to get ready for the annual San Carlos and San Jose homecomings and to accommodate written requests.

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Ladies of Charity Extends Help to the Young and Elderly, Scholars, Poor Families and Inmates

Last September 27, in celebration of both the anniversary of the Lingap Lolas program as well as the feast day of St. Vincent de Paul, patron saint of the



Ladies of Charity, the Ladies of Charity-CTK Chapter held a celebration at the Matthew-Mark Rooms. The Lingap Lolas, consisting of super-elderly from the Libis community who had been adopted by LOC for nearly a decade, prepared a special dance number.

Last October 1, the Ladies of Charity's livelihood project, Housekeeping, held its graduation ceremony at Matthew-Mark Rooms. The 18 graduates of the threemonth program were automatically hired by Clean Zone, an Air B&B company. In attendance at the



graduation were Barangay Captain Mariano Agua Jr., QC Social Services Development Department head Jessica Montejo, and TESDA trainor Geraldine Garac. Representing LOC were president Tonette Arrizabal and Livelihood chairperson Teri Floro.

The Ladies of Charity distributed rice at the Libis community last November 18



during the Day of the Poor. 400 families received five kilos of rice each.

It was gift-giving last November 19 at Manila City Jail when the Ladies of Charity – Metro Manila Diocese visited, with Fr. Serafin 'Pery' Peralta, spiritual adviser of LOC AIC Phils., presiding over the mass. For each of the 300 senior, disabled, and sick inmates, the LOC





ladies gave two kilos of rice, Tide and Perla laundry bar soaps, Safeguard bath soap, assorted groceries, food pack with rice, pork and chicken adobo, hard boiled eggs, banana, and bottled water. In reciprocity, the MCJ warden Senior Inspector Del Natividad gave the Ladies of Charity a Certificate of Appreciation for the gifts given to the inmates. Representing LOC were National President Tessie Fajardo, VP Paulette Songco, Treasurer Melanie Aquino, board members Anita Casas and Elsie Matalote, plus officers and members of different Metro Manila units. Our very own Fr. Steve Zabala led a pilgrimage starting last October 26 to the Holy Land: Off the Beaten Path, that took the 30-plus pilgrims, which included the entire extended family of Acropolis village coordinator Anne del Rosario to Israel, Jordan, Palestine and Egypt. Also on the pilgrimage tour were several Daet, Bicol friends and townmates of Fr. Steve, which resulted in a happy reunion event.

We asked Fr. Steve if the Daet-based reunion was an accident. 'No', he answered. 'Regina Ong-Field, a good friend and a year below me at La Consolacion College in Daet, now Australia-based, called me last year and said 'Steve, I want to spend my 50th birthday in the Holy Land next year. I can



form a group but can you be our pilgrimage chaplain?' And I said yes. So she brought her sister Rowena Ong-Cortez with husband Gerry, her friend and ex-officemate Albert Sarte, and schoolmates Girlie Sicat-Root of Arizona and classmate Lyn Nepomuceno of Florida, and Manila-based Dr. Em-em Villanueva, sister in law of the former Daet mayor.' Fr. Steve further clarified, 'In my college days, during our seminary summer break, I played in the town's annual summer basketball league and these guys used to watch these games. So we all know each other very well.'

The pilgrimage began on October 26 in Amman, Jordan and concluded on November 5 in Cairo, Egypt. First stop was Amman, Jordan, visiting the mosaicfilled Madaba Greek Orthodox Church and then mass at Mt. Nebo, reputed to be the place where Moses was shown the Promised Land. No trip to Jordan is complete without a full-day visit to Petra. The group then crossed over into Israel, with Nazareth as the first stop. The

the Cenacle or 'Upper Room' on Mt. Zion which was the site of both the Last Supper and Pentecost, Church of Dormition and Benedictine Abbey.

After mass in Palestine's Ramallah, the pilgrimage crossed over into Sinai at the



pilgrims visited the site of the Annunciation, the Church of St. Joseph where they had mass, and the Greek Orthodox Church of St. Gabriel to see Mary's Well.

The following day itinerary included the Mount of the Beatitudes with a morning mass, Capernaum to see Peter's House, Tabgha for the multiplication of loaves and fishes and Peter's Rock, and a boat ride on the sea of Galilee. The next day, the group went up Mt. Tabor for the Basilica of the Transfiguration, then to Cana for the first miracle at the Cana Wedding, where married couples were able to renew their marriage vows during the 10 am mass. At the Jordan River, the pilgrims got to renew their baptismal vows. They also got a chance to take a dip in the Dead Sea's healing waters, after passing by Oumran to check out the caves where the Dead Sea scrolls were found.

Then on to Palestine-controlled Bethlehem, where the pilgrims visited the site of the Nativity, St. Catherine's Church, and St. Jerome's Cave. Mass was celebrated at 4 pm at Shepherd's Field, reputedly where the shepherds first saw the star that led them to the infant Jesus.

On November 2nd, the group visited Jacob's Well in Samaria then drove to Jerusalem to visit the Mount of Olives, with the Ascension Chapel, Pater Noster Church, Dominus Flevit Chapel, Gethsemane Garden, and the Basilica of the Agony with mass at 5 pm. It was still the Old City the next day, with the Church of St. Anne, the Via Dolorosa, Basilica of the Sepulchre where mass was celebrated at 10 am, the Wailing Wall,



Taba Border. On the last day, the group arrived in Cairo. Fr. Steve left the group before they crossed over into Egypt.

With Anne del Rosario were husband Fred, daughters Mollie and Lizzie, together with eldest daughter Trixie and her family -husband Javi and young daughter Charlie. The del Rosarios had very positive words for Fr. Steve's chaplain role. 'His sermons were always relevant and entertaining,' Javi answered. 'He explained the significance of the different sites well - and he was able to relate how the events of a thousand years ago are still applicable to present life', said wife Trixie, Trixie's sister Lizzie added, 'He made sure we did our morning prayers and he was always sensitive to our readiness to praying on the bus or not.' Head of the family Fred del Rosario chimed in, 'Fr. Steve was very accommodating'.

Anne was very positive on the pilgrimage. 'One of the best graces of the pilgrimage for me was hearing my children converse back here at home about how awesome it was to walk on the same ground that Jesus walked. They also discussed which places they'd go





CTK Parish Pastoral Council Concludes 2019 Planning and Budgeting

In a whole-day marathon last October 13 at the Eugenio Lopez Center, the CTK Parish Pastoral Council met to present, discuss and review the 2019 parish pastoral plans and budgets. The meeting, which lasted from 9 am to 6 pm, was the culmination of a full week of intensive meetings, from September 17 to 22, by Fr. Steve and the Parish Pastoral Officers For education, on which Fr. Steve would like to continue putting emphasis, the two organizations charged with implementation are Ladies of Charity, LOC, and Knights of Columbus, KOC. LOC plans to continue giving scholarships to 130 high school and 20 college students in 2019, at the same time requiring an 85 GPA and attendance in twice-monthly

led by treasurer couple Bing and Elise del Rosario, with the individual ministries and mandated organizationsrenewal movements regarding the ministry-org-movement's proposed plans and budgets. The projects that were approved and their corresponding approved budgets were shared with the rest of the PPC at the Planning Presentation meeting. As with the individual ministry-organization reviews, where the heads were requested to relate the proposed project to the 8-point diocesan agenda, the final Planning Presentation meeting required the proponents to again relate the approved projects to the diocese sevenyear agenda.

The biggest chunk of time was given to Mila Bangco and her Social Services & Development Ministry, since 58% of the entire parish pastoral funds are allotted for social services projects. Mila clarified the ministry's objectives – poverty alleviation and improvement of living conditions of the oppressed, exploited and depressed families in and around the parish and diocese. With the addition of Christian Family Movement, or CFM, the number of mandated organizations and prayer communities deputized as implementing agencies of SSDM increased to seven.

scholarships and financial assistance. In addition to the P2.8M budget for educational assistance, some P200,000 is also budgeted for the catechetical talks and recollections of the scholars.

the Libis community. For 2019, CWL has dropped Bagumbayan Elementary School.

Livelihood and skills training is the thirdbiggest outlay for SSDM, with P650,000 allocated to three different organizations involved, though the bulk is done by Ladies of Charity, with their TESDAapproved Pinoy Hilot Massage and Hotel Housekeeping courses. Mother Butler Mission Guild continues to support the outsourced knitting and needlework operations farmed out to the Christ the King Greenmeadows GK project in Zabarte, Novaliches. Catholic Women's League has been requested to look for a second site to outsource vestment and altar cover knitting-embroidery work.

CTK will continue with its prison apostolate at the Camp Karingal ladies dormitory, to the tune of P335,000 in 2019, with CWL and Apostleship of Prayer sharing in the outreach – CWL doing the formation talks and giving away the official yellow t-shirt while AP coordinates masses, with both teams providing snacks during masses and formation talks. A tiny piece of the prison budget is given to Buklod ng Panginoon to assist them in their work at the Molave youth center.

The tiny remainder of the SSDM budget, roughly P55,000, goes to support medical-dental missions of both Catholic Women's League and Buklod ng Panginoon. Finally, P90,000 is reserved for CFM's catechism classes at St. Vincent de Paul home for abused girls.

The Worship Ministry and the Formation Ministry will take the next biggest slices of the Parish Pastoral Council budget for 2019. P740,000 was approved for Worship Ministry, headed by Peter and Leila Banico and P600,000 for Formation Ministry headed by David Ong. The large budget for Worship Ministry is understandable given that there are five liturgical ministries under it – Lectors & Commentators, Greeters & Collectors, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC), Altar Servers, and Music. Sixty percent of the entire Worship Ministry budget is allocated to the Music liturgical ministry under Beniie Mirasol and the funds are spent primarily for the allowances of the music teachers and arrangers who train the choirs in the ten weekend masses. EMHC, led by Albert Cuadrante, gets the next largest slice, with P120,000, nearly half of which is allotted for its World Day of the Sick outreach. P70,000 goes to the Altar Servers liturgical ministry, headed by Louie Laudico, to be spent primarily for prayer books and 50% subsidy for the albs.

Formation Ministry will spend its P600,000 for its Coffee After Church program (30%), 'School of the Word' Bible Formation Series (25%), and the Catechism of the Catholic Church monthly series (15%). Life in the Spirit (LSS), Parish Renewal (PREX) and other formation talks take up the rest.

Youth Ministry, Vocation Ministry, and Family & Life Ministry come next in the 2019 budget allotments. The P500,000 budget for the Youth Ministry, headed by Louie and Lei Abando, is divided into several activities: Parish Youth Day sometime August; three-day Youth Camp in April and November; overnight weekends by Days with the Lord in January and May; World Youth Day vigil in January; weekly youth prayer meetings to be held jointly with Living Hope's Timothy Ministry; PREX Youth in April; and Day of Sacraments outreach in August.

Of the P400,000 budget for Vocation Ministry, 75% is allotted to sponsorship of diocesan seminarians. This budget will support three seminarians at P5,000 per seminarian for 10 months. Headed by Louie Laudico and Anna Lagman, the ministry's other activities include: CTK alumni priests reunion on St. John Vianney's feast day in August; subsidy for parishioner participants in the Life Directions Seminar; Parish Vocation Month celebration; breakfast encounter between CTK altar servers and diocesan seminarians; and Vicariate Vocation Sunday.

The P300,000 budget approved for Family & Life Ministry, headed by Regie and Joanne Polancos, is planned to fund the following: weekly meetings of the Courage program for youth feeling samesex attraction; Father-Daughter Camp in March and Father-Son Camp in October, to foster closer relationship, bonding, and me-time with fathers; monthly facilitated meetings of single parents;



and parenting talks for parents of the LOC-KOC scholars. Several talks are also lined up – family planning, Courage-related, single parenting, depression and suicide, etc. The Family & Life Ministry is also responsible for the quarterly Marriage

Vocation Program but the activity is selffunding since fees go directly to the ministry.

The Children's, Seniors', Catechetical Ministries and the Basic Ecclesial Communities (BEC) have been given P125,000-P175,000 budgets for 2019. The P175,000 budget for the Children's Ministry, also known as Mustard Seed Ministry, and headed by Sonny and Mina Mejia, is directed at several projects, which include: the annual Kingdom of Heaven Fair, or 'Holyween'; the Easter Fair; Feast of Sto. Niño; the annual First Communion; children's choir support; volunteer workshop; plus art material and book expenses. The P160,000 budget request by the Seniors' Ministry, also known as Sunrise Ministry, headed by Drs. Doy and Estrelle Lopez, was approved, to fund: two general assemblies of seniors in May and November; monthly visits to the sick and elderly in the parish; monthly tai-chi and dancing sessions; and every other month painting sessions. Also planned is a pilgrimage to Metro Manila heritage churches in February.

Catechetical Ministry, headed by Alma Yeh and Sheryl Coronel, has a P150,000 budget, 80% of which will be spent for KOC scholars. The P128,000 BEC budget will be divided among – BEC Awareness talks in June; weekly Bible sharing in Libis; Salubong during Holy Week; monthly street masses in Libis; plus various Libis transportation-related costs. BEC is headed by Eileen de Leon.

Rounding out the bottom are Public Affairs Ministry and Media Ministry, with P70,000 and P85,000 budgets, respectively. Public Affairs Ministry, headed by Jing Alampay and Rene Montemayor, will provide PPCRV Election Watch support at the barangay level in May; and conduct the Seven Habits for Highly Effective Individuals Workshop for PNP officers in September.

Media, headed by Bing and Elise del Rosario, will continue to publish the quarterly Herald newsletter; support the Christthekingparish.ph website; operate the electronic bulletin board display at the entrance of the main church; maintain the FB page; and for 2019, to install large screen TVs as projection screen at Matthew-Mark and Luke Rooms. 80% of the 2019 media budget will be for website hosting charges since Herald printing continues to be provided for free by Mila San Juan of The House Printers.

The budget for the annual Kumpilang Bayan also comes from the Catechetical Ministry. But the biggest demand on their time is still with the catechism classes for the twice-monthly LOC and

Lastly, administrative charges of P375,000 have been built into the 2019 budget. 55% will be for the salary cost of the PPC administrative assistant and 40% will be for the 2019 planning and budgeting meetings in the June timeframe, as the diocese moves to a July to June fiscal year.
