I thas been a year like no other. Same time, last year, our parish was riding high on the crest of a just-concluded 40th parish fiesta. We had also launched our Casa Setenta and were excitedly counting down to achieve astounding donation targets. Life was pretty much structured, our goals defined, our plans down pat.

But that all changed when the pandemic struck. More than nine months into the multi-level quarantine triggered by the crisis, and in the middle of a traditionally festive Christmas season, we're caught up in different kinds of "surges" in our lives. While some fear the surge of infection especially during this season, I am blessed to witness the relentless surge of the CTK parish community.

The community is continually experiencing the *surge* of *spirituality*.

The crisis has brought us to our knees. Despite government restrictions, faith has flourished in the community. Even with physical distancing, age limitations, health declarations, face masks and shields, we continue to fervently pray together. I witnessed how wave after wave of residents knelt on hard concrete as I raised the Blessed Sacrament during our village blessings. I was there during one virtual praying of the Rosary when Zoom limits were breached because of the number of participants. Even Fr. Arvie Bello and Fr. Bong Tupino were able to join. We continue to celebrate our sacraments even if we have to modify some practices, such as we did during our Kumpilang Bayan. My heart is full when I see more people join our Masses not only in the main church, but also online. I am told that our Facebook Mass attendance has grown by leaps and bounds. This proves that our spirituality is a journey, unimpeded even by the pandemic. We continue to pray and have faith. The need to connect to God is greater now more than ever.

In this parish, I also felt the intense *surge of urgency*. During the first days of Oplan Covid, which we launched in March just after the lockdown, I was overwhelmed by the sense of urgency shown by this community. I would send an appeal on behalf of Libis community or frontliners late at night, and would be overwhelmed by the response when I wake up the next day. Oftentimes, the response would exceed the original request. People here know that timing is just as crucial as helping. Lives are on the line. The pandemic has made us realize the fragility of life. There is simply no time to waste.

Then again, day after day, I see this unraveling, the surge of responsiveness.

has become doubly challenging. Our online Masses were set up under lockdown with a team that had no previous broadcast background. Catechetical and other formation talks were painstakingly organized virtually. The youth has conducted a slew of online meetups. Even our Pre-Cana has continued via Zoom. No choir allowed? No problem! Father Ricky, Father Jojo, and I will gladly sing for you! Not to be outdone in having fun, our parish fiesta switched to jovial mode via Kumustahan and Christ in Our Hearts Concert-Rewind. From the parish staff to ministries, everyone just spontaneously stepped up to the plate.

A parish for others, we keep experiencing the *surge of goodness*. Even with Casa Setenta paused, someone donates a hefty amount. Even if the effects of this crisis have wreaked havoc on parish finances, Oplan Covid and Greenmeadows outreach efforts have raked in millions in cash and kind for the needy and those at the frontlines. Here, the term *ayuda* means more than just a doleout. It is synonymous to a commitment to care. Even with the inconvenience of observing health protocols, the community is patient, mindful that little sacrifices can save lives. Even with slashed pay, the parish staff serves with diligence and *malasakit*. Goodness manifests in many forms and faces, and I see this every single day.

And finally, we are constantly comforted by the *surge of encouragement*. Many have lost loved ones. Many have lost livelihood. Many feel alone, desperate. We are confronted by the reality of our mortality like never before. But we strive to be always here for one another. In one of the talks organized by our Public Affairs Ministry, we are reminded of the need to be sensitive to another person's struggles. We listen to each other's silent

The same breakout groups worked together to answer trivia on the Church, the Bible, and current events. Participants became more competitive when they played solo in Bring Me with a Twist.

The afternoon proved that a three-hour program online was possible with the youth. It turned out to be a fun, engaging, and insightful Parish Youth Day, after all.

Our English word *advent* comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming." And so when we celebrate Advent, naturally the question is, "What is coming?" Or, "Who is coming?" Our reply to that is very simple. As we know, "What is coming" is Christmas. Do we realize what Christmas really means? Who is coming? Our reply is, Jesus the Messiah. But again a deeper question we ask ourselves is, who is Jesus to me? Who is He to each and every one of us?


There is a corresponding attitude to the word *coming*. And that is waiting, expecting. If we are therefore waiting for a celebration, who are we waiting for? And this is the important thing. Are we prepared to celebrate Christmas? Christmas is not just Santa Claus, the Christmas tree, and Christmas décors. It is the commemoration of the coming of Jesus, the Son of God, born as a baby of the Virgin Mary in Bethlehem in order to redeem us. So let's reflect on our relationship to Him.

There is a beautiful tradition among the Irish people. When Advent comes, they always have a candle by their windows. It is as if they are sending a message to Mary and Joseph: "Come, there is room for you in this house." There is a parallel to this among Filipinos. It is our *parol*. "Joseph and Mary, please come in. There is a room here where Jesus may be born."

So as we prepare to celebrate this season of Advent, waiting for and expecting our Lord, let us now ask Him:

God our loving Father, look down with love and mercy upon your children as we bless You, we praise You, and thank You for all the graces and blessings that You have showered upon us. Continue to abide with us that we may prepare duly for the coming of our Lord and Savior.

WHO IS COUNTING ON WHOM?

A reflection by Fely Ong on Bishop Pablo David's recollection

- 1. God is not found in the most beautiful carvings of wood and stones or artifacts. Bishop Pablo "Ambo" David shared the story of a Spanish man who wanted to buy an image of Christ Jesus from a store selling religious items. He asked the store owner for the most unique, beautiful, and realistic image of Christ among the precious stones and antique wooden items. What struck me was the response of the owner: the real and authentic Christ can only be found among the ordinary people in the street, the children playing in the alleys, families living in the elevated expressways, the beggars, the sick, the downtrodden, the hungry, and the unemployed wondering aimlessly in the peripheries.
- 2. To be a true Christian is to love and be merciful even to the unlovable sinners and criminals. No one is inherently born bad. It's the circumstances of their existence and the social environment that turn them to be such.
- **3.** The crucifix doesn't symbolize suffering. It primarily symbolizes love—love that is willing to suffer for others. Love has two dimensions.

The horizontal line reminds us about love for others (our relationship with humankind), and the vertical line reminds us of our love for God (our relationship with our Lord). $\, \bullet \,$



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CHRIST THE KING: COUNTING ON US IN THIS TIME OF PANDEMIC

A tour fiesta recollection facilitated by Bishop Pablo "Ambo" David last November 14 his insights led me towards a deeper meaning of the kingship of Jesus Christ. Inasmuch as my understanding of Christ as King is more than the popular image of Christ who is crowned and with a scepter, Bishop Ambo added to my perceptions by moving my focus more towards the Crucified Christ upon whose cross is expressed a deeper concept of unconditional love... love of God (vertical stance of the cross) and neighbor as oneself (horizontal stance).


The Jesus haters named him with a plate of wood whereupon was written, "INRI"—Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews. We know now that the kingdom He spoke of is the kingdom in the here and now, a kingdom where selflessness reigns, where the image of the strong is radically stripped to that of a servant. The parables of Jesus are replete with this servanthood. As He preached, He turned upside down the people's perception of a leader.

His words, which he constantly turned into action gave a different meaning to salvation. Jesus, from His early ministry believed in inclusivity. We all belong to the Father. His encompassing prayer which He taught His disciples resounded to what Bishop Ambo perceives as Jesus' "vision and mission" and taught them (and us) "to live on earth in such a way that people can say heaven has indeed begun already."

Yes, we all seek and long for Christ to be King of our hearts and of our lives. At times, we get despondent for He seems so far.

Bishop Ambo shared a most touching poem by Dolores Mistral, a Nobel Prize winner for literature. Here is the last segment of the poetry aptly translated in Filipino: "Ang imahen ni Kristo ay huwag hanapin sa mga museo. Hindi mo siya matatagpuan sa mga estatwa, sa mga altar at templo. Hindi sa prusisyon masusundan and mga yapak ng Nazareno. Huwag mo siyang hanapin sa kahoy o sa bronse, sa bato o sa eskayola. Mas mabuting hanapin mo siya sa mga dukha—sila and mga imahen niyang laman at dugo."

This is not a call for a paradigm shift. This clearly calls for us all to continue our pursuits of charity during this pandemic crisis.. and beyond.

Despite the lapse of nine months since March, otherwise considered as the start of the covid 19 pandemic, many Filipinos are still hesitant to go out of their houses, even to go to public places like the church where they definitely can find solace or comfort against all the negative narratives in the news about COVID-19.

As far as we know, the faithful desire to hear Mass live again but are petrified because of the several outbreaks of COVID that continue to be reported not only nationwide, but worldwide. Is there any doubt that COVID cases are starting to go up again?

So when we heard of the plans of Fr. Steve Zabala, parish priest of Christ the King Church (CTK), to bring to the people and the various subdivisions under the aegis of CTK the Blessed Sacrament, we felt ambivalent about it.

We were ecstatic because bringing the Blessed Sacrament to the people is something extraordinary. Only something like the pandemic can make it into a possibility. More importantly, the faithful, most especially those who have stayed put in their houses, would get to experience such moment of grace and blessing.

Apprehensive because it would be the first time and it was difficult to imagine how the people would react. Will they brave it and decide to wake up early and stay under the morning sun in order to witness the ceremony? Also, it has been reputed, albeit unofficial, that in Acropolis, unlike in other subdivisions where Roman Catholics outnumber non-Catholics, the ratio is said to be 50-50 (Roman Catholic vs. non-Catholic).

So one month before the appointed Saturday, November 21, we applied for and fortunately obtained the approval of both the Acropolis Homeowner's Association and Barangay Bagumbayan to hold the Village Blessing. During the twoweek period prior to November 21, messages on Viber and posts on Facebook were sent, as well as letters distributed to all houses. It was simply impossible to predict the outcome, what will happen, how the residents will react.

What transpired during the procession of the Blessed Sacrament was a beautiful sight to behold. The turnout was a delight to see. Families, drivers, and kasambahays came out to welcome the Blessed Sacrament and Father Steve. Even non-Catholics, whether out of curiosity or otherwise, ventured out and waved their handkerchiefs as well. Some knelt and prayed as the Blessed Sacrament passed them by and there was visible joy on faces that awaited outside their homes. The people were a picture of humility, smiling and happy at the sight of the Blessed Sacrament.

For sure it was also a humbling and arduous task for Father Steve to bring the Blessed Sacrament to bless the homes and the residents. We venture to say that the Lord's presence in the Blessed Sacrament was much needed by the people, most especially during this pandemic, if only for the opportunity for adoration and thanksgiving it offered everyone.

We would like to thank Father Steve for his patience and sense of duty. But more importantly, we marvel at his forbearing attitude, uncomplaining as he carried on with his task under the heat of the morning sun.

Not surprisingly, we got requests that blessing the village with the Blessed Sacrament should be held more often or, at the very least, once a year. *Donec iterum* (till next time then)!

"Typhoon Ulysses forced a reschedule of the Blessed Sacrament's visit to our place. But when the day finally came, the sun was shining brightly, the air made pure by the passing storm. White handkerchiefs were ready to be waved, white banderitas shared, and treasured Christ the King banners were hung out or held high. Barangay chairman Butz Tenchavez drove the pickup bearing Father Steve and the Blessed Sacrament as the CTK hymn "Christ in Our Hearts" played in the background. White Plains parishioners were one in praying, thankful and hoping that the village would be blessed again soon."





The year 2020, in many ways, has been a year of sadness and uncertainty. People's lives were suddenly disrupted by COVID-19. Globally, the news has been bleak. However, we who have faith in Jesus, know that everything works for good for those who love the Lord. Our faith, hope, and charity are strengthened in the midst of the crisis and we are consoled by the ever steadfast presence of the Church.

Not to be deterred in the Church's mission to make disciples, the Catechetical Ministry had its annual Kumpilang Bayan on November 14 with 36 confirmands consisting of 27 teens (mostly CTK parish scholars) and nine adults. Each confirmand was accompanied by one parent and one sponsor totaling a crowd of over a hundred attendees. The confirmands received catechetical preparation via Zoom in four sessions beginning on October 24. The confirmands learned about salvation history, the mission of the Church, grace and sacraments, the Eucharist, Confirmation, and spiritual preparation through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Likewise, parents and sponsors received instruction on their responsibilities in the continuous formation of their children in the Catholic faith.


The confirmands who were below the IATF age limit obtained special quarantine passes from their barangays to attend the Confirmation rites.

The adult confirmands included two civilly wed couples, Benigno and Charlene Bartolome and Nilo and Roxanne Luces, who sought the sacrament in preparation for their church wedding.

One of the young confirmands, Jvette Faith dela Cruz, also received her First Communion.

CTK parish priest and vicar general of the Diocese of Cubao, Fr. Steven Zabala, who was deputized by Bishop Honesto Ongtioco, presided over the rites. During his homily, Father Steve explained that Confirmation strengthened baptismal grace and enabled those who received the Holy Spirit to be more faithful in carrying out their baptismal promises. He cited as examples, Mary who, by the Holy Spirit, gave her fiat to God's plan for her; Jesus who began His public ministry upon receiving the Holy Spirit; and the disciples who became emboldened to preach the Gospel when they received the Holy Spirit during the Pentecost. Father Steve said that as with the Pentecost when the Church was born into the world, Confirmation launches Christians into the world to live their Christian faith more actively. Father Steve reminded the confirmands that Confirmation meant they were now ready to take responsibility for their Christian mission—to be courageous and to stand firm in their faith.

Using cotton swabs, Father Steve anointed the confirmands on the forehead with chrism oil.

Day in and day out, security guard Giovane Villan, Pableo Lamanilao, Olimpio Secang, and OIC JR Juampit would patiently check every visitor's temperature at CTK and make sure that face masks and face shields are worn. Some guests have raised voices at them and fingers wagged in their faces by those who insist on breaking health protocols. But they have remained humble yet firm, unfazed yet courteous during these unpleasant encounters.

From Tuesday to Sunday, parish office staff continue to accommodate visitors when quarantine was eased and office work resumed. Because of health reasons, air-conditioning is off and the workplace may be stifling at times. And guests can also be demanding in their transactions. Yet, Marj Ruga, Tonette Adelaida, Bella Consulta, Eula Victorio, and Esmer Magalong exercise maximum tolerance and just do their work diligently.

At least twice daily, since March, the production tandems of Noel Miro and Eugene Catungal, or John Dequina and Jay Gascon would man the live-streaming of Masses. Never mind if the OBS and other technical details were foreign at first. Never mind if their camera work was shaky they were spooked by technical glitches at first. They listened intently to Father Steve's production tutorials and learned the basics in record time. These days, they are constantly experimenting and perfecting their shots and angles to give online Mass goers a truly spiritual experience albeit virtual.

Robert Figueras, armed with his disinfecting equipment would sanitize the entire church after each liturgical service with the energy and precision of an Avenger. Sometimes his work would be delayed by a lingering churchgoer. Cion Orallo and Imelda Mira would be at the "back of house," busy taking care of the personal needs of priests and staff, nourishing the clergy as the priests feed the souls of the faithful.

They are just some of CTK's quiet heroes.

Quarantine restrictions due to COVID-19 have impacted church finances all over the world. CTK is no exception. Even if the parish continues to rake in huge donations for health workers and other impoverished communities, it was also bearing the brunt of limited resources and the additional costs of keeping Mass goers

Even if they are aware of the health risks of interacting with visitors, they express confidence that parish management is doing all it can to keep them from danger. They also try to understand the strain that the Mass goers or the visitors are going through as they cope with the quarantine. And at the end of each work day in the pandemic, they retire to their quarters simply happy to be alive, to be together, and to be of service to their family and to God in their own small ways.

The next time you run into one of CTK's silent heroes, there are about 22 of them around, give them a warm smile and a kind word. That would certainly make their sacrifice worthwhile.

CATHOLIC WOMEN'S LEAGUE: WOMEN WHO RESPOND

How does one pool an almost 90 percent senior membership to meet in order to respond to the needs of those most affected by this pandemic? From day one, it had been a challenge to get each of their suggestions. Most of them don't even have Zoom, much less know how to use it. But this did not stop the members of the Catholic Women's League (CWL) from doing what we do best—respond to a need. With old-school technology—using the landline, calling each other on the cell phone, text messaging, and Zoom meeting for those who have millennials at home to help, the unit was able to decide that our brothers and sisters in prison would most benefit from what we can offer, especially during the period of lockdown.

At the start of the ECQ, we got in touch with Quezon City Female Dormitory in Camp Karingal. They requested for canned goods and noodles. With limited logistics, we were able to send them boxes of sardines. When rules were a relaxed a little, the unit again sent them 700 packs of sanitary napkins, 800 bars of bath soap and a variety of vegetables consisting of string beans, eggplants, and green chili harvested fresh from a farm of Baby Banal's friend.

Then God blessed us more through the Parish Pastoral Council. With the funds allocated for CWL, the unit was not only able to reach out to QCFeD but also to Quezon City Jail for Men.

kits for the PDLs (person deprived of liberty) of the female dorm in Camp Karingal. This donation inspired us to also donate hygiene kits for the Quezon City Male Jail. Through referrals, we were able to purchase contents for the hygiene kits at discounted prices. Special thanks to Mai Supetran of ACS Manufacturing Corporation, Fred Nartates of Gentle Supreme Philippines, and Joyce Tanedo for Sales Team Marketing.

Three thousand hygiene kits were packed and distributed to the PDLs of Quezon City Male Jail. Each kit contains Wings laundry detergent powder, Shield Bath Soap, two Close Up twin packs and three Sunsilk Shampoo triple sachet. These were packed in the parish with the help of Ivy and Jefei Yeh, kasambahays Lizel and Susan, and parish janitors Bentong and Ricky.

HEALTH CARE WORKERS CONTINUE TO COUNT ON CTK

As the COVID war stretches way beyond what many expected, other calamities of typhoons, flooding, and landslides kept CTK parishioners on their toes in helping out the victims. Even then, CTK did not forget the plight of the health care workers who were plodding on in the fight against COVID-19. In its most recent outreach activities, CTK turned over 100 pieces of hazmat medical-grade PPE to Quirino Memorial Medical Center, eight pieces of automatic temperature scanner and alcohol dispenser to the emergency triage of the Lung Center of the Philippines, and P14,000 worth of grocery items plus three boxes of three-in-one coffee to the East Avenue Medical Center Employees Association for distribution to its members.

The beneficiaries showed their thanks as they greeted CTK on the occasion of our 41st fiesta. No less than Dr. Eugenio Jose F. Ramos, president and CEO of The Medical City sent in his video greetings:

I am very happy that apparently the COVID crisis has stabilized and has gone down. But in behalf of the Medical City, I would like to really say thank you to the Christ the King Parish for the help that you actually provided us at the time when we really needed it most, when we have problems with the shelter of our workers, when there was in difficulty in transportation and the safety of our nurses and our staff. You came to our rescue, and we really appreciate that.... Congratulations on your 41^{tr} anniversary. Most of us are actually parishioners, in a sense that we go there for our spiritual needs. I am personally very close to one of yours, Bishop Raul Martirez, who has been coming here to Medical City for his health needs, and for our spiritual needs as well.... May we continue to work together even after the crisis because there are so many other areas where we can work together.

Aside from providing shelter for the frontline workers, CTK also helped those displaced by the pandemic. Of this, Dr. Jesusa Catabui, OIC of the UP Health Service had this to say:

October 2020 Rosary Month via Zoom

As a child instinctively clutches on to her mother at the first sense of danger, so too did the world turn to Mary at the news of the pandemic. Our parish did no less.

Immediately after the quarantine was implemented, the Legion of Mary organized a sign up system using Viber to continue the 2000 Hail Mary devotion. The first was held on April. Anyone may sign up for a 30-minute time slot during which he/she or a group pledges to pray 100 Hail Marys for a particular intention. Some would opt to pray on their own, others as a group via Zoom. After their turn, they sign in to the Viber group to signify completion of their turn.

Many families took to a more fervent daily praying of the rosary to implore the intercession of our Lady for protection. Pre-pandemic, during October, the month of the Rosary, the different communities of the parish would gather for their respective nightly community rosary. This year, the entire CTK community gathered as one, although virtually. Through the collaboration of the Legion of Mary, the worship ministry and the BEC ministry, and the effective promotion by village coordinators, the October Rosary via Zoom was organized.

The devotees gathered every afternoon at 5 PM daily (4 PM on Sundays) from October 2 to 29 with the different communities taking turns in "hosting" by assigning their residents to lead the prayers. Each community adopted a template that worked best for them. Some had many residents assigned to lead, some had just a few, and some had families leading. But, regardless of the style adopted, the number of participants was consistently high every night, and on a few occasions, even breaching the maximum number our Zoom account allowed. A group of five (Jane Aldeguer, Leila Banico, Eileen de Leon, Maan del Rosario, and Buh Malonzo) who were just learning the Zoom controls and features, provided the "tech" support. By God's grace, every day of the rosary went technically well.

On each day, the group prayed for a relevant and timely intention (for the world or for the Church or for the Pope and the clergy, etc). Each decade was prayed for the many people affected by COVID-19 in different ways. Every day, the participants consecrated the Philippines to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Rosary month was opened on October 1 in the main church with Maney Salem of the Legion of Mary and Mel Novales of the Lecom ministry, leading the rosary. This was live-streamed via CTK FB. The closing was on October 30, also held at the main church and live streamed via CTK FB. Leading the prayers were Belle King of the Legion of Mary and Buh Malonzo of the Lecom Ministry. Father Steve, Father Ricky, and Father Jojo also joined as rosary leaders with Enclave, Ivory Court, and Libis communities during the last Zoom Rosary on October 29. Fr. Arvie Bello was present virtually all the way from Rome during the blessing of rosaries when Greenmeadows was the lead group. Even Fr. Bong Tupino was able to join one of the prayer sessions. Father Steve led the blessing of Rosaries on October 30 as part of the culmination of Rosary Month.

Many participants lingered after the prayers as if wanting to savor the experience of being in the community, albeit virtual.

POPE FRANCIS DECLARES YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH, CHURCH GRANTS PLENARY INDULGENCE

The Apostolic Penitentiary issues a Decree granting plenary indulgences for the year of Saint Joseph proclaimed by Pope Francis on Tuesday. The special year will last from 8 December 2020 to 8 December 2021.

Pope Francis on Tuesday announced a special year dedicated to Saint Joseph starting from 8 December 2020 until 8 December 2021, on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the proclamation of Saint Joseph as the Patron of the Universal Church, as well as the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of Our Lady.

The Apostolic Penitentiary also issued a decree granting special indulgences for the duration of the special year to celebrate the anniversary and "to perpetuate the entrustment of the whole Church to the powerful patronage of the Custodian of Jesus."

During this period, the faithful will have the opportunity to commit themselves "with prayer and good works, to obtain, with the help of Saint Joseph, head of the heavenly Family of Nazareth, comfort and relief from the serious human and social tribulations that besiege the contemporary world today."

Devotion to Saint Joseph

The decree signed by Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, the Major Penitentiary of the Apostolic Penitentiary, and the Regent, Fr. Krzysztof Nykiel, notes that devotion to Saint Joseph has grown extensively throughout the history of the Church, "which not only attributes to him high reverence after that of the Mother of God his spouse but has also given him multiple patronages."

At the same time, the Magisterium of the Church continues to discover "old and new greatness in this treasure which is Saint Joseph, like the master in the Gospel of Matthew who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old."

Therefore, the gift of indulgences granted through a decree of the

Apostolic Penitentiary by mandate of the Holy Father "will be of great benefit to the perfect attainment of the appointed purpose."

Conditions for the plenary indulgence

The plenary indulgence is granted to the faithful under the usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions) to Christians who, with a spirit detached from any sin, participate in the Year of Saint Joseph on these occasions and manners indicated by the Apostolic Penitentiary:

- The plenary indulgence is granted to those who will meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer, or take part in a Spiritual Retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on Saint Joseph.
 "Saint Joseph, an authentic man of faith, invites us," the decree reads, "to rediscover our filial relationship with the Father, to renew fidelity to prayer, to listen and correspond with profound discernment to God's will."
- The indulgence can also be obtained by those who, following Saint Joseph's example, will perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy. Saint Joseph "encourages us to rediscover the value of silence, prudence and loyalty in carrying out our duties," the decree notes.
- The recitation of the Holy Rosary in families and among engaged couples is another way of obtaining indulgences, in order that "all Christian families may be stimulated to recreate the same atmosphere of intimate communion, love and prayer that was in the Holy Family."
- Everyone who entrusts their daily activity to the protection of Saint Joseph, and every faithful who invokes the intercession of Saint Joseph so that those seeking work can find dignifying work can also obtain the plenary indulgence. On 1 May 1955, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph "with the intent that the dignity of work be recognized by all, and that it inspires social life and laws, based on the fair distribution of rights and duties."
- The plenary indulgence is also granted to the faithful who will recite the Litany to Saint Joseph (for the Latin tradition), or the Akathistos to Saint Joseph (for the Byzantine tradition), or any other prayer to Saint Joseph proper to the other liturgical traditions, for the persecuted Church ad intra and ad extra, and for the relief of all Christians suffering all forms of persecution. Because, the decree notes, "the flight of the Holy Family to Egypt shows us that God is there where man is in danger, where man suffers, where he runs away, where he experiences rejection and abandonment."

A Universal Saint

In addition to these, the Apostolic Penitentiary grants a plenary indulgence to the faithful who will recite any legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of Saint Joseph, for example, "To you, O blessed Joseph" especially on "19 March, on 1 May, the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, on St. Joseph's Sunday (according to the Byzantine tradition) on the 19TH of each month and every Wednesday, a day dedicated to the memory of the saint according to the Latin tradition."

The decree recalls the universality of Saint Joseph's patronage of the Church, noting that Saint Teresa of Ávila recognized him as "a protector for all the circumstances of life." Pope St. John Paul II also said that Saint Joseph has "a renewed relevance for the Church of our time, in relation to the new Christian millennium."

For the sick
