February 5, 2022, Saturday, was a historic day in the parish life of Christ the King Greenmeadows. In solidarity with the Philippine's yearlong celebration of 500 Years of Christianity, CTK welcomed the Jubilee Cross in its church where it will stay until March 5, 2022. No less than Cubao Bishop Honesto F. Ongtioco DD presided over the Welcome Mass with concelebrants Fr. Steve Zabala, Fr. Rowan Rebustillo, and Fr. Reg Tiongson. Fr. Rey Paglinawan served as MC. In his homily, Bishop Ness highlighted the significance of the visit in three words: gratitude, missioning and witnessing. Here are his reflections.

GRATITUDE

As we look back to our past since the planting of the seed of faith in our Philippine soil, we thank the Lord for His countless blessings. We cannot thank God enough for the gift of faith. What kind of life will we live and enjoy if we have never heard of Jesus and His good news? Would we know how much we are loved by a merciful and compassionate God empowering us with that same love to love others? Would we have hope and see some light in the midst of this pandemic, political and economic crisis and other burning issues

that affect our nation, our people and our future? Would we have the heart to reach out to others in the midst of difficulties? Many people getting hungry, losing some of their loved ones, losing their jobs, business and other ways of supporting their families.

Because of the faith, we have learned how important it is to bond, to journey together in a synodal way, and to care for one another. We learned the importance of growing together and bringing each other to Christ who unites us. Because of the faith, we are taught that we have a mother, Mary, who loves us, who guides us, who intercedes for us, and who never leaves us alone but loves us the way she loves her Son Jesus. Yes, we will never be alone as we journey in this valley of tears.

We give some attention to an important symbol of the faith. It is the Cross. It used to be a sign of punishment for criminals. But when Christ was nailed on this cross, its meaning radically changed. The Cross becomes a symbol of deep and true love. "Greater love has no one than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."







- Perform a work of charity




Prayer to Christ the King

WALKING TOGETHER AS A CHURCH

Lessons from the CTK Worship Ministry Mini Conference

Almost a hundred parish volunteers belonging to its various ministries attended the online Worship Ministry Mini Conference on January 22. After the preliminary program that included an opening song cum prayer by the Novo Concertante Manila, Father Steve Zabala gave the talk to his eager co-workers in the Lord's vineyard. His topic: Synodality.

The Synod on Synodality is a two-year process of listening and dialogue that will culminate with the Synod of Bishops at the Vatican in 2023. Christ the King parish participated in the synodal consultations last year, where parishioners divided into small groups, gave their inputs on ten questions that the Pope and bishops are seeking answers for.

In his talk, Father Steve defined synod as walking or journeying together. He started with a historical background of papal authority and the role of bishops in the church so his listeners could have a better grasp of what Pope Francis is trying to accomplish in this upcoming synod.

From a dominant papal power that exercised moral but not administrative authority, to the rise of the bishops to rule over the church with the pope, Father Steve explained that Pope Francis wants synodality to permeate all levels of the church—the laity, the pastors, and the bishops of Rome walking together and actively participating in the life and mission of the church.

Previous synods throughout history—like the famous Vatican II that renewed the Catholic Church in modern times—involved only the church leaders. But this time, the Pope wants us, the laity, to be part of the discussion. Towards the end of his talk, Father Steve referred to the Micah 6 where God asks Israel to walk humbly with Him. "Because we have freedom, not all will walk with Jesus," Father warned. But if we respond to Pope Francis' call to synodality, we will become a missionary church that listens to the voice of the Spirit and goes forth as God's people.

Side by side with Father Steve, extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist Manny de Leon and Leo Tan painstakingly blessed the residents with holy water. Thank You, Holy Spirit for giving them the energy to walk the entire length of the blessed activity.

Bing del Rosario, on his scooter, took beautiful pictures of the residents and captured the joyous moments. Bing demonstrated that riding a scooter is not only for the young but for the "young once" as well. His pictures, including those taken by Vince, were posted in the AGHAI Facebook page, which gave everyone the opportunity to download a memento of the visit.

About 80 percent into the route, the golf cart lost power. But this did not deter Fr. Steve from doing what he does best as a shepherd of God's flock. Father Steve donned a cowboy hat and continued the blessing on foot until he hopped on to the rear end of Vince's SUV. Some of the residents couldn't help but comment that under any circumstance, Father Steve is indeed game, a "cowboy" who is willing to do everything necessary to accomplish his mission.





THE GIVING **CONTINUES**

Tr. Steve Zabala recently updated the CTK parish on the outcome of the 42nd fiesta fundraiser, 500 Years of Giftedness and its contribution to the Typhoon Odette relief efforts. The 500 Years of Giftedness is a gift-giving activity with health care workers, residents of poverty-stricken areas and scholars.

On November 25, 2021, CTK delivered the following:

- Five hundred boxes of vitamins (each good for 30 days) to health care workers of the East Avenue Medical Center, Quezon City General Hospital and the Lung Center of the Philippines.
- Food packs and vitamins to 500 residents of the poorest parishes in the Diocese of Cubao through Caritas Cubao.
- Food packs and vitamins to 500 residents of Barangay Libis and Barangay Bagumbayan.

The initial target of the campaign was to raise P950, 000.00 for the intended beneficiaries.

As usual, generous CTK parishioners exceeded the goal. The total donations received reached P2,159,201.00! Cash donations reached P2, 080,451.00 while in-kind donations and vitamins were valued at P78, 750.00! Father Steve jokingly said that this was the kind of "disobedience" that is very much welcome.

He further informed the parish of the breakdown of expenses, which is as follows:

Food packs: P 500,191.20 Vitamins for health workers/poor residents: 235,250.00 500,000.00 Tuition fee assistance:

A generous donor gave 500 packs of vitamins and CTK was

able to get a lower purchase price for the succeeding 1000 packs. With the substantial savings and bigger collection, Father Steve said that CTK was able to give additional 500 food packs to Libis and Bagumbayan residents. CTK was also able to increase tuition assistance to talented but financially-challenged students of the parochial schools of the Diocese.

All told, CTK still had an excess fund of around P900, 000. This was allocated for food distribution to poor communities, aid to health care workers in government hospitals and Typhoon Odette relief efforts.

o you still remember how you felt when you received your first Holy Communion? Last November 20, we witnessed 21 children who eagerly awaited this moment. After two postponements due to the lockdowns, God allowed it to finally happen on the eve of the Feast of Christ the King. The face masks

the children wore couldn't hide the excitement they felt.

The Mustard Seed Ministry held two batches of online Catechism in May and October to prepare children for the Sacrament of Holy Communion. The attendees were from Cebu, Cavite, Laguna, Muntinlupa, Taguig and even Guam—true to our calling as a parish for others. Some opted to receive Holy Communion in their respective parishes after completing the sessions.

"Teacher, what would happen if Adam and Eve did not eat the apple? Will we still be in paradise?" "Why didn't God just destroy the tree so that they wouldn't have eaten the fruit?!" "If Satan is in hell, why is he there in the garden of Eden?" These were just some of the innocent but thought-provoking questions the young participants asked during the online classes.

Their parents and guardians were also invited to an online recollection given by our Fr. Steve Zabala, who spoke on the Real Presence of Jesus. He also officiated the First Communion Mass.

After being away from the church and locked at home for months due to the pandemic, last November 13 was their first time for many of these first communicants get out of the house. They also had their first Sacrament of Reconciliation with Father Fr. Rowan Rebustillo and Father Reg Tiongson. Some of their family members also took the opportunity to go to confession. CUBAO DIOCESE TO ITS FAITHFUL: DISCERN. BE PARTISAN

To prepare for the forthcoming national elections, the Diocese of Cubao is launching a discernment process with the aim of aiding its faithful in choosing its leaders for the next six years. On February 8, 2022, Cubao Bishop Honesto "Ness" Ongtioco issued a pastoral letter entitled "Let us Discern Together."

In this letter, Bishop Nes stressed that while the Church will keep its non-partisan role and be vigilant in guarding the votes through the Parish Pastoral Council for Responsible Voting (PPCRV), it will be proactive in the preparation of the faithful in exercising its civil and moral right to vote.

Vicar General and CTK's parish priest Fr. Steven Zabala detailed the step-by-step process that the diocese will undergo in preparation for the elections. He cited the importance of voter education and the discernment process in which the Diocese is enjoining the entire faithful to participate. He said that the discernment process, a mandate of the Catholic Bishops Conference of the Philippines (CBCP), is an act of synodality, of walking together, and an act of listening to the urgings of the Holy Spirit and to each other. In its letter "Seek the Common Good," the CBCP said, "We encourage voters to be very discerning in their votes. Let the lay groups engage in discernment circles to help one another know the candidates well and choose the candidates with the common good of the whole country in mind and not according to what the candidates promise."

The diocese will continue its traditional modes of voters' education through PPCRV seminars, videos, and posters. It has a scheduled Diocese Voters' Education Seminar via Zoom on February 24. But Father Steve emphasized that beyond these usual forms, the country's current dismal state aggravated by the pandemic has made the matter of choosing the next set of leaders urgent and crucial. This is the reason why the diocese has decided that more than listening, discussing, and discerning, there should be positive, concrete action and active participation in the nation's political process.

Father Steve shared that the three-month discernment process will entail forming discernment circles of six to ten people discussing and discerning for one to two hours. Each discernment circle will tackle the sanctity of their vote and responsibility and how their vote will translate to witnessing. The exercise will also entail mock elections to scrutinize the backgrounds and track records of each candidate. It will highlight the 4Cs that should be considered in choosing their leaders—character, competency, commitment, and compliance.

The final part of the process may be the most difficult. Father Steve says that when choices have been discerned and decided, one should be a herald and organize circles of discernment among their own families, neighbors, and organizations. He said that each person should be partisan and actively campaign, convince people, and volunteer in their chosen candidates' groups. The call to action will include actively posting vetted facts on social media, fighting fake news, and when able, sharing financial and material resources to the campaign.

To further stress the objective of the diocese for embarking on this endeavor, Bishop Ongtioco says, "As your pastors, it is our duty to provide guidance to all of our lay faithful. It is our duty to urge the lay faithful to participate in this electoral process with mind, heart, and soul open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit—and if the Spirit so moves you, to be partisan: to actively support and promote the candidates whom you have prayerfully discerned as best able to bring Gospel values to government."

Father Steve said that the discernment process is nothing new in the mission of Christ. In fact, he says it is always been Christ's mission to "bring glad tidings to the poor, give sight to the blind, liberty to captives, make a jubilee year." And with the Philippines sinking to the bottom of the global pandemic response ranking—with more than 54,000 dead out of 3.6 million infected with COVID-19, with one in every five Filipinos experiencing involuntary hunger, and thousands of Filipinos jobless or underemployed—each person's vote on May 9, 2022, is sacred, crucial and an act of Christian charity and love.

DP Kit. We will be releasing the Cubao Diocese's Discernment Process Kit on February 12. This kit will contain:

- the DP circles of discernment module developed by Fr.
 Nelson Orqueta, which is a 1
 hour module based on Gospel values, and done in the mode of spiritual conversation
- · a DP guide for facilitators
- a parish activation plan—
 where we propose steps on
 how to roll out DP in the parish
- information material on the different candidates.
- and other supplementary material.

Start When Ready. If parishes are ready to begin planning and implementation, there is really no need to wait for anything else.

Laity Lead. Instructions will be given to the Diocesan clergy to support the laity in taking the lead in carrying out the DP in their parishes. So, dear lay leaders and parishioners, spearhead the DP in your parishes.

Facilitators' Training, Feb 16. For those who wish and for those who

may find this session helpful, we shall meet again on February 16, at 8:00pm (zoom link to be sent to your PPC heads). Fr. Nelson will demonstrate the circle of discernment process and explain it further. Since this will practically be a training of facilitators, we hope that participating parishes can also invite those who have the skills and/or training for facilitating group processes, those who are willing to learn, and willing to engage in DP as facilitators. Facilitators play a key role in this discernment process. We are especially interested in tapping and training lay people to be the DP facilitators; however, parishes may also invite priests, religious and seminarians who are gifted or trained along this line.

Other Schedule for Training. If still needed, we will advise you of other facilitators' training schedules.

March Diocesan Assembly. We will gather the Diocesan Laity by mid-March or by the third week of March to consolidate the initial results of the community DPs and discern what further action the laity will take.

Discernment Process positively received by the assembly. This will be the main format of Voters' Education in the parishes.

We are running out of time. True. But let us do our best. Reach as many people as possible. Set targets and timelines, and work hard.

Results Consolidation. Let us move fast and finish the DP by mid-March. We will gather by mid-March or the third week of March to consolidate initial results of community DPs and discern what further action to take. The DPs in parishes do not necessarily need to stop at that point. The DPs can continue, so as to reach as many people as possible.

PPCRV. There might be a shortage of PPCRV volunteers because of the DP, and the mandate of the PPCRV will suffer.

The PPCRV's non-partisanship has to be protected and preserved because it has an important role in ensuring that votes are counted. Some parishioners have to be dedicated to this. Parishes may decide to dedicate certain people exclusively to PPCRV duties. Still, because the DP is a non-partisan process, PPCRV volunteers can in fact—if they wish to do so--serve as DP facilitators without compromising the non-partisan position they must adopt as PPCRV.

In the Circle of Discernment module, volunteering in the PPCRV will be part of the list of possible actions DP participants can engage in—if they are moved to do something after the DP session.

Candidates' Info. The facilitators do not have enough information about the candidates and their stands on issues. Other groups have done their research and there are existing, updated materials already. We can make use of these materials. Information sheets on the candidates will be provided in the DP Kit.

Other dioceses around the country are also moving in the area of engaging the lay in discernment and participation in election-related activities. While some bishops and priests have decided to take a more visible, frontline role in these activities, most have decided to remain low-key, but are actively providing the laity with guidance and accompaniment. Different modules of DP sessions are being used across the dioceses.

The Diocese of Cubao is also doing its share in sharing our DP module and mechanics with other dioceses.

Non-partisan process. People might ask the DP facilitators: why don't you just tell us who to vote for, since you have more access to information and you know more?

For the facilitator, it could be tempting to give an answer; however, doing so may compromise the non-partisan nature of the process. The DP is also aimed at helping people come to their own decisions, based on the framework of faith that the discernment circle provides, and within the context of prayer and spiritual conversation. People who are allowed to come to their own decisions are also likely to act on the fruit of their discernment. The key for facilitators is to invoke the Holy Spirit, and to trust the process.

CTKP-GM DONATES MORE THAN P4.9M TO CUBAO TAYO **FUNDRAISER**

Tall it yet again a case of not following instructions or overflowing generosity.

When the Diocese of Cubao gave CTK a target of Ph4 million as part of the P30M target for operational expenses in 2022, some thought that it was a formidable goal. The diocese needed the funds to answer for the costs of running diocesan operations including salaries, utilities, and catechetical expenses among others.

Apart from giving each of the more than 40 parishes a suggested target, the diocese held a Christmas Chatathon called "Cubao Tayo! One Diocese. One Church" participated in by the different vicariates from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m on December 4, 2021, at the Lantana offices. Several celebrities and guest sharers and influencers were on hand during their assigned segments to chat with online viewers and accept donations and pledges.

The Vicariate of Our Lady of Perpetual Help to which CTK belongs had its host priests, Fr. Steven Zabala of CTK and Fr. William Garcia of the Nativity of Our Lord parish. They were joined by co-hosts, television personality Diane Medina and CTK BEC coordinator Eileen de Leon. The entire Dabarkads of Eat Bulaga, CTK's Novo Concertante, and singing priests Fr. Steven, Fr. William, and Fr. Ricky Montanez provided the entertainment numbers. Multiawarded author-influencer and CTK's The Herald editorin-chief Rissa Kawpeng provided some spiritual insights in the segment.

At the end of the day, Fr. Steve reported that CTK raised a total of P4,994,500.00 in cash and pledges exceeding the target by almost a million pesos. Cash donations amounted to P4,789,500.00 and pledges worth P205,000.00. Fr. Steve said that the amount was turned over to the Diocese of Cubao. Marlon Manaol one of the fundraiser's organizers said that as of January 2, 2022, total funds raised reached P18,302,052.75.

THE CTK SYNOD HARVEST

The following are highlights from the official report Christ the King Greenmeadows (CTK-GM) submitted to the Diocese of Cubao on the Synodal Talks in preparation for the forthcoming Synod on 2023. This first part speaks of the process and the inputs culled from online gatherings of the different sectors of the parish community, which is a preparation for the Synod of Bishops in Rome next year.

The Process

CTK-GM first set up a core synod team, consisting of a facilitation lead Loung Cuartero, scheduling and logistics head Maan del Rosario, and overall coordinator Bing and Elise del Rosario, plus advisers Tessa Mangahas, Albert Cuadrante, and Leila Banico, headed overall by parish priest Fr. Steve Zabala. The facilitation lead identified, over the span of ten days from October 2 to October 12, twenty-four parishioners with proven track records and invited them to join the facilitators and note-takers team.

The Virtual Gatherings

The focus of the CTK-GM core team was to ensure maximum participation by the Libis Basic Ecclesial Community (BEC), the only underprivileged sector in the parish; and the kasambahays, who are part of the households in the gated communities. Hence, the very first sessions were five simultaneous synod conversations with Libis residents on October 23, organized by the BEC-Libis. No major CTK-GM group remained untouched in the drive to generate participation in the synod conversations. The biggest ministries, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) and Lector-Commentators, each had a number of sessions. All the villages participated. Other ministries also fielded participants— Sunrise, Youth, Young Catholic Professionals, Catechetical, and Family and Life. The organizations and movements also had their synod conversations—CFC, CFM, Buklod ng Panginoon, Diwanihan Kristiyano, Knights of Columbus, Ladies of Charity, CWL. Even the parish staff formed their own synod grouping.

The Listening

Companions on the Journey. The family members are the most important companions on the journey. Typically, parents influence their children, the father provides support for the religious journey,

and in turn, the mother pushes her children on their own faith journeys.

Interactions. There are limited interaction between ministries. Also, given the economic class divide, the majority of well-to-do parishioners unconsciously "tune out" their poorer neighbors.

Speaking Out. The priest is acknowledged as the official spokesperson for the parish. But can we adopt the practice of other denominations to allow laity to occasionally talk at the altar?

Celebration. It's impressive that as the whole, CTK-GM has good homilists; lively music on the weekends; effective lectors and commentators; and there's always enough EMHCs to assist.

Common Mission. CTK is blessed to have the unique mission of being a "parish for others." That has arisen from more than a decade of being a Stewardship Parish. Most of the parish activities and projects align with this mission. Its focus on social action is unique and highly commendable. CTK's Oplan COVID and Pantry for Others are great examples of how the Church can touch those who have been marginalized by the pandemic. It was also pointed out that the Libis community has been the beneficiary of so much giving from the rest of the parish. When that community expresses a need, there is always someone or a parish group ready to help. Perhaps it's time to "distribute the wealth" and go to the other areas of the diocese that need more help?

Ecumenism. Catholics are often criticized for not being friendly, welcoming, and sociable—we arrive just in time for the Mass then quickly leave at the end, unlike our other Christian counterparts like CCF, Victory, and other Pentacostals and evangelicals. They do a lot of socializing before and after service. Can we introduce the concept of "fellowship"? Maybe we can bring in features of the services of other Christian faiths to make ours livelier?

Authority and Participation. CTK-GM is a big parish that covers a large geography, a large number of parishioner families, and a large and very involved laity. But size also presents a problem since it can be intimidating and it's harder to feel a sense of belonging and camaraderie. The solution is to have small groups where involved parishioners can be part of, and which naturally fosters this feeling of belongingness.

Forming Ourselves in Synodality. Participants were guardedly optimistic that the Catholic social teachings on human dignity, common good, social justice, and reducing the wealth gap are not just "flavor of the month" topics but would be taken seriously by the clergy and the faithful, given that Pope Francis continues to lead.

A IC or International Association of Charities is an NGO of women with more than 100,000 volunteers in 55 countries who work in their local communities to combat poverty. The Ladies of Charity - AIC Philippines is a member of AIC International.

The Vincentian Family Coalition members are AIC, Congregation of the Mission, the Daughters of Charity, the Sisters of Charity Federation and the International Confederation of the Society of St. Vincent De Paul. The coalition chose homelessness as the focus of its advocacy work at the United Nations.

AIC International and AIC New York has chosen our Ladies of Charity (LOC) project "Rebuilding Houses Damaged by Typhoon Rolly in Naga City, Philippines" as part of the First Vincentian Family Project for the upcoming session 2021 -2022 at the United Nations, with the topic "What Happens When People Have Housing? Better City—Better Life," which we presented to the coalition last October 28, 2021.

Our project started right after typhoon Rolly hit the Bicol region in November 2020, which was the world's strongest typhoon in 2020. Typhoon Ulysses came eleven days later.

LOC-AIC Philippines immediately sent support to LOC Naga City and LOC Libon, Albay. All our units in eight regions showed solidarity by giving donations. AIC International also sent donations.

The ocular visit and assessment after the typhoon made by the basic ecclesial community of St. Jude Thaddeus parish showed 1,980 individuals were forced to leave their homes, 309 houses partially damaged, and 58 houses destroyed in their parish.

Together with our partners Fr. Francis Tordilla, parish priest of St. Jude Thaddeus and Melba Vera Cruz, diocesan president of LOC Naga City, we were able to rebuild 58 houses.


Last September, the local government of Naga City gave 20 lots to 20 informal settlers living in sub-human condition in damaged houses and needing relocation. We were able to get donations for seven houses from the Vincentian Family Homeless Alliance based in London, three houses from AIC International, and two houses from LOC-AIC Philippines. The 12 new, one-bedroom and toilet duplex and lot will be awarded to 12 families.

The ground-breaking ceremonies and distribution of Certificate of Lot Allocation was held last November 19. Construction of the 12 duplex houses started on December 1, 2021 and is located in St. Isidore Village, Barangay San Isidor, Naga City.

There are still eight families praying and waiting for donors to help them have a decent home. Each house cost only P70,000. Interested donors may contact Tessie Fajardo, president of the National AIC Ladies of Charity, at 09178114424.

We also distributed five hundred boxes of Klin-C vitamins with zinc to health workers of Quezon City General Hospital, Lung Center of the Philippines, and the East Avenue Medical Center. In addition, the sum of P250,000 was given to the Diocese of Cubao as financial assistance for scholars. With deep gratitude, we in the SSDM would like to recognize our generous donors and benefactors who made these activities possible.

While we face uncertainties, lifelong learning is a must to meet the challenges of the changing times. Our love for our neighbors will remain steadfast. We embrace the new normal with hope and optimism. Looking ahead, we would like to enhance our ongoing projects and resume our livelihood and feeding programs. We all thank God for the opportunity to love and serve.

The service of lectors and commentators for our online Masses was put on hold too.



Forty-four lectors on-site and 77 others online were installed by Fr. Steve Zabala on December 5, 2021. The attendees enjoyed learning the dance and said it made them feel more part of the parish now that they know the steps to the hymn. The dance was followed by an afternoon of games and activities. In the spirit of the Feast of Christ the King, there was also a quiz bee round for some CTK trivia. It was fun to see everyone just relax and have fun while learning more about the parish, taking part in the games, and of



course, get excited about the different prizes they were able to win in the raffle draws.

The usual talk portion of the Parish Youth Day happened in a separate event entitled "Life-Changing Journeys," which was in collaboration with the Young Catholic Professionals Ministry. Instead of the usual structure of just one speaker talking to an audience, the session took the "Fireside Chat" approach wherein a panel of speakers has an open conversation with the audience. Three speakers were invited, each representing possible scenarios the audience may relate to: Sophia Bello was invited to talk about graduating college and starting a career online; Dani Cornejo to talk about having to switch careers because of the effect of the pandemic; and Mark Ruiz shared his story as a business owner during this pandemic hit. The insights shared were reflective and reminded everyone that they're not alone during these times, and yes, it's been two years in, but it's still okay to not have everything figured out. After everything we've gone through, the parish is truly blessed to still witness a strong spirit of community even though we're still just seeing each other through the screen.

THE LAST TIME I FELT LIKE THIS

At the cusp of yet another year, I am overwhelmed by mixed feelings. Somehow, I feel I'm gripped by something like a continuing Advent when the dark hues of purple are lightened up by the rosy colors of dawn.

TOUCH

Before the pandemic struck, CTK was riding on a high spurred by the celebration of its 40th anniversary. Then March 2020 happened. We were forced to "distance" from each other to stem an invisible enemy called COVID-19. People so tactile were suddenly not allowed to touch. But this community could not keep their helping hands to themselves. *Para-paraan*, as we say in Filipino. The community found ways to touch the lives of people who were desperately in need of aid. And in my report in the succeeding pages, the people keep outdoing themselves in generosity. Enter Oplan COVID. Enter the Pantry for Others. And so many more. These days are surreal. We can't even think of going out without a mask. We are scared to shake hands, and we bump elbows instead. We can't deny the lingering fear of being infected, but this is overcome by a compulsion to reach out, help—and touch others.

TRADITIONS

I am incredibly happy and grateful that we went all out in our 40th celebration. It was tiring but so fulfilling. We realize now that there are several traditions that may not return as we continue to grapple with our new normal. Will communion be always by hand? Will we return to public kissing of the Baby Jesus in the crèche? Will Confirmation ever be back to anointing by hand? Or even to the simplest, will the horde of eager kids ever feel safe to make *mano* to their parish priest again? Will we ever discard our masks and sing with gusto and in unison again? At first, the modifications are jarring and tend to make our revered traditions feel less satisfying. *Parang walang dating*. The Jubilee Cross is hoisted at the main altar. But we refrain from kissing or touching it because

of the virus. But then we realize that we are enlightened by the real significance beyond these gestures. Respect for the Host. Homage to the Babe in the manger. Missioning in the anointing. In the end, we are made to see that even with alternatives, without usual traditions, faith happens and takes over as it should.

TIMES

So we are flipping our calendars. So a lot of us have gotten our initial vaccines and boosters. We continue to remember the last time we zumba-ed in a big Christmas party, the last massive school graduation, the flamboyant weddings and processions, the last time we hugged and kissed and made *mano*. Happy times indeed.

Now we look forward to meeting new people physically and virtually. There are those we've discovered from online Masses, Rosaries, Zoom, and Google meet-ups. These times we've learned to prioritize faith and family over fleeting pleasures. Even our voters' education campaigns are effective via virtual means. More than a thousand attended our recent Halalan Pulong. Things are hopeful.

TOGETHER AGAIN

There is only one way to live out our Christian life, and that is being together. Maybe not as touchy-feely, hug after hug, beso-beso kind of being together. But this time a togetherness drawn by a bond woven by a common mission. Onsite Masses are back. People are returning to the church to worship publicly. I was elated to see the elderly and the children cautiously, but with a gleam in their



eyes, enter our church once again. I was delighted to see trusty church volunteers come back to serve. We were not trained at the seminary to celebrate the Eucharist before a camera no matter how high-tech we are. So many of our rituals that are anchored in our spontaneous togetherness have been snatched away. Still, we will continue living in a tapestry of new habits that are molded and bonded into a kinship borne of our faith in Jesus Christ.

We keep this in mind as we celebrate our being a Jubilee Church. I am overwhelmed with mixed feelings of hope and anxiety. The last time I felt like this was when I took my vows to be your *kura* three years ago. There was a wee bit of trepidation by the challenges, but more fueled by hope. We continue to be a parish for others. We continue to pray for safety and healing. We continue to be vigilant in our Christian duties including preparing spiritually, mentally, and physically for the crucial national elections. We

death. The cross is a sign of love, a love that is total self-giving, and true love.

MISSIONING

The receiving of a gift does not stop in us. The theme of our 500 YOC celebration is "Gifted to Give." This captures what it means to be grateful for the gift that we have received. After we have been blessed with the faith, we are asked to bless others with the same gift.

The call to share the gift we have received is missioning. We have a mission. We are sent to spread the Good News that can change and transform the world. There is just too much work to be done. It is important that we are patient and persevering, and learn more how to listen to people. We are now in the preparatory stage of the 2023 Synod of Bishops. We are doing some consultation where we listen to many people especially those who do not come to Church regularly or even non-Catholics. We listen to their expectations, dreams, pains, hurts, and their cries so that we can know what kind of Church the Lord wants us to become.

WITNESSING

We are challenged to listen while we are walking as a people disregarding economic status, educational attainment and other sub-cultures that can alienate people. This will not be easy, but it's a process that takes time, patience, and constant evaluation, a process that requires prayer, discernment, and openness to the ways of the Spirit. Concretely, we have the coming May elections, and we are asked to remind our people to participate actively. We thank God we have come up with a Discerning Process by which we educate and form our people in the right way—to encourage their active involvement in choosing our future leaders with the proper criteria.

As we continue our journey in this 500 YOC celebration, we look ahead with hope and courage. We are asked to be creative and explore different ways in fulfilling our duty to evangelize the world. And yet being a missionary starts at home. It starts in the family where God wants to dwell and remain.

Let me end my homily with this popular poem entitled "Hang It on the Cross" by Logan Parker:

If you have a secret sorrow, A burden or a loss,

continue to be a parish for others.

Let me cull some lines from a song from the movie "Same Time, Next Year" sung by Johnny Mathis and Jane Olivor.

Oh, the last time I felt like this I was falling in love, Falling and feeling, I'd never fall in love again. Yes, the last time I felt like this, was long before I knew What I'm feeling now with you.

Yes, I've fallen deeply in love with this community. I have hope that this community will be vigilant and discerning in their Christian duties including choosing the right leaders for the next six years. Kapit lang. We've got this because our patron Christ the King has got our back. Welcome back to CTK!

An aching need for healing... Hang it on the cross.

If worry steals your sleep And makes you turn and toss, If your heart is feeling heavy... Hang it on the Cross.

Every obstacle to faith Or doubt you come across, Every prayer unanswered... Hang it on the Cross
