very new chapter in life invites us to pause, reflect, and recommit to our deepest hopes. Today, our Church and our parish stand at the threshold of such a chapter—a new beginning, and with it, new life.

This moment is graced by the leadership of our newly elected Pope, Leo XIV. His presence brings not only a change in title but a fresh wind of hope, peace, and vision for our global Church. His pastoral imagination—a concept beautifully described by theologian Dr. Campbell-Reed as the ability to visualize new and creative ideas and actualize them with hard work and commitment. It is already transforming the way we understand leadership and discipleship.

Jesus Himself was a master of pastoral imagination. Through His parables, His radical welcome of the poor and excluded, and His bold challenges to the powers of His day, Jesus reimagined what it means to live a flourishing human and Christian life. Pope Leo XIV follows in His footsteps—not by copying, but by creatively embodying Christ's message for our time.

A Shepherd of Peace and Imagination

When Pope Leo XIV stepped onto the balcony of St. Peter's Basilica for the first time, his opening words were: "Peace be with you all!"—the same words the Risen Christ spoke to His disciples. It wasn't merely a greeting. It was

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a declaration of intent. He reframed peace as something "unarmed and disarming, humble and persevering." In a world weary from conflict, division, and spiritual fatigue, these words felt like healing balm.

His choice of name—Leo XIV—is also meaningful. Inspired by Pope Leo XIII, the great defender of laborers and promoter of Catholic social teaching, our new pope signals his commitment to justice, dignity, and solidarity. He dreams boldly within the Gospel and acts decisively in the world.

Walking with the People

In his first homily, Pope Leo quoted St. Augustine: "With you I am a Christian, for you I am a bishop." These words say it all. He is a shepherd who listens before he leads. A man who walks humbly with his flock. His embrace of synodality—journeying together as Church—is not just a theme; it is his lifestyle. He is building bridges, not walls. He fosters unity, not uniformity. This is pastoral imagination at its best.

Courage, Compassion, and Creativity

Pope Leo XIV has not shied away from speaking prophetically. He dares to address uncomfortable realities—war, poverty,

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ecological crises—not with fear, but with a heart filled with Gospel courage. For him, the Church is not a fortress to be defended, but a field hospital and a family home where healing, creativity, and hope take root.

He calls us not merely to survive, but to *flourish*—to live fully human and deeply Christian lives. And that flourishing must include everyone: the broken, the searching, the lonely, and the lost.

As Thomas Merton wisely said, "We are not at peace with others because we are not at peace with ourselves, and we are not at peace with ourselves because we are not at peace with God." Pope Leo leads us back to the source of peace—God Himself—and invites us to rediscover that peace within and among us.

A New Chapter in Our Parish

As we give thanks for this new beginning in the universal Church, we also celebrate a new chapter here in our CTK parish community. God has blessed us with a new Parish Pastoral Team—faith-filled men and women who have accepted the call to serve.

To our new team: thank you for your yes. Your willingness to serve, to imagine new paths for ministry, and to make CTK Parish *a parish for others*, is deeply appreciated. May your hearts be filled with the same pastoral imagination that inspires Pope Leo XIV: bold in vision, gentle in spirit, and rooted in the Gospel.

Moving Forward Together

Let us walk together in this time of renewal, both globally and locally. Let us be a Church and a parish that doesn't fear new beginnings, but welcomes them with joy, hope, and faith. Let us allow the Spirit of God to breathe new life into our ministries, our relationships, and our mission.

In the words of Pope Leo XIV, "Peace be with you all!" May that peace inspire us to live creatively, love generously, and serve faithfully—now and always.





he celebrant wanted a low-key and simple event. But grateful clergy and an equally blessed community had other ideas. On Wednesday, June 18, 2025, Cubao's Bishop Emeritus and CTK's resident bishop Most Reverend Honesto F. Ongtioco DD was feted in a Thanksgiving Mass at CTK's Main Church.


Friends and clergy from the Diocese of Cubao including Vicar General Fr. Frederick "Jojo" Simon, CTK parish priest Fr. Aytoy Opiniano, guest and visiting priests, Cubao Diocese's Chancery staff and others gathered to give thanks for the nurturing presence and pastoral leadership of Bishop Nes who shepherded the diocese for more than two decades before he turned over the reins to Bishop Elias Ayuban Jr. in December 2024. Sine Nomine Choir carefully chose and rendered the songs that perfectly fit the occasion.

In his homily, Bishop Nes emphasized that he considered the event not as one of personal achievement, but a "humble thanksgiving to God's abundant grace, and to the people God has entrusted to my care; for it is walking with you, listening to you, serving you and praying with you that my calling as a bishop finds its deepest meaning."

Bishop Nes also recalled his service in 3 dioceses – 5 years in the Diocese of Balanga, Bataan, 2 years in the Diocese of Malolos and 21 years in the Diocese of Cubao. He said that he had tried to always serve with joy and give his whole heart for the Gospel. He waxed grateful for the sustaining grace of God and the communities' kindness and prayers through the years. He realizes that his greatest mission as a bishop lies not just in ministry but in the "simple, ordinary moments, visiting sick, encouraging the discouraged, listening to the small voice of the poor, and simply being present like Jesus was."

Vicar General Fr. Jojo Simon said that Bishop Nes always had a low-key celebration of his Episcopal Ordination anniversary due to pressing matters as Cubao Bishop and member of finance councils of the local Church. For a while, he said the bishop's anniversary became part of fundraising efforts for various causes. On behalf of Bishop Eli, Fr. Jojo thanked Bishop Nes for his decades long guidance and nurturing of his brother priests, and promised prayers for Bishop Nes, "to always be the shepherd that we need."

Bishop Nes enjoined the communities to keep praying for his "little self", saying that he needs God's mercy and everyone's support to keep serving with a heart rooted in Christ.



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THE JUBILEE OF THE SACRED HEART

he month of June is traditionally dedicated to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. This is to venerate, honor and imitate Jesus who has a heart that loves beyond measure.

But in the many activities surrounding the Jubilee Year of Hope pronounced by Pope Francis, we may have forgotten that this year, we also celebrate the Jubilee of the Sacred Heart.

It was in the Octave of Corpus Christi in June 16, 1675 when the Sacred Heart appeared to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque when she was before the Blessed Sacrament in Paray Le Monial, France, an event which is referred to as the "Great Apparition". It was here that the Sacred Heart spoke these words to St. Margaret Mary – that His Sacred Heart "will open wide and pour forth lavishly the influence of its Divine love on all" who will receive Holy Communion on the Feast of the Sacred Heart in a spirit of reparation.

June 2025 is exactly 350 years from when Christ requested this feast. In CTK, we celebrate the Jubilee by having the Sacred Heart Novena and consecrating our families to the Sacred Heart in Masses starting June 13.

Pope Francis came out with the encyclical "Dilexit nos" in October 2024. One of the passages read "It could be said that I am my heart, for my heart is what sets me apart, shapes my spiritual identity and puts me in communion with other people."



In a recent interview, Filipino Cardinal Chito Tagle, Pro-Prefect of the Dicastery for Evangelization, talked of the Filipinos' devotion to the Sacred Heart, "The devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is widespread in the Philippines. We are grateful to the many religious orders bearing the name "Sacred Heart", the Society of Jesus and the Apostleship of Prayer that promote the devotion in dioceses, parishes, schools and families. In addition to vigils and prayers every first Friday of the month, it is customary to have the image of the crowned Sacred Heart in one's home. We beg the Heart of Jesus to rule and govern our families and nation with His mercy and love. This prayer comes from a people whose hearts have experienced being wounded when injustice, greed, corruption and indifference rule.

Tagle also said that this "devotion is a reminder that we should constantly beg Jesus to transform our hearts to be like His." He mentioned that the Filipino faithful still sing a hymn to the Sacred Heart in Spanish where the nation offers its heart to Jesus: "no más Amor que el tuyo, O Corazón Divino. El Pueblo Filipino te da su corazón." The song never fails to bring consolation to the heart and tears to the eyes.

The Feast of the Sacred Heart is on Friday, June 27, 2025. Let us receive Holy Communion on that day in a spirit of loving reparation for the outrages our Eucharistic Lord has received.

Indeed, our devotion to Mama Mary is deeply ingrained. *Tagos sa buto, nakaukit sa puso.* We have many names for Mary. We dedicate churches and shrines to her. No wonder our country is called "Pueble Amante de Maria" (People in Love with Mary).

In CTK, we celebrate Mary as our line to her Son, Jesus. We come together in prayer, and our hearts are filled with peace and faith that our prayers are answered according to God's perfect will.

n May 16, our parish community in Greenmeadows gathered at the Garden Lounge for a beautiful Marian celebration titled "The Greatest Woman Ever." The event, organized by the Basic Ecclesial Community of Greenmeadows, brought neighbors together in a spirit of devotion and gratitude to Our Lady.

The evening started at 5:30 p.m. sharp with the recitation of the Holy Rosary led by Arlene Veloso and Eileen de Leon. Afterwards, parishioners solemnly processed forward, as Sine Nomine choir members Rissa Kawpeng and Monica Uy filled the air with song. Each attendee carried a long-stemmed rose to present to Mary.

The highlight of the evening was the talk by Danny Moran, a Greenmeadows resident and daily CTK Mass goer. A sports enthusiast and chairman of the Henry V. Moran Foundation which helps underprivileged kids through sports development, Danny also chairs the PAREF schools. His life exemplifies the balance between worldly responsibilities and spiritual devotion as he juggles the demands of running Amici Restaurants and Cara Mia Cake and Gelato stores.

Danny's presentation was both enlightening and inspiring, as he skillfully wove together the rich tapestry of salvation history. He drew compelling connections between

Old Testament characters and events and their ultimate fulfillment through Mary's *fiat*—her willing acceptance of God's plan at the Annunciation. Through his words, participants gained a deeper understanding of how Mary's role in our salvation was prefigured throughout Scriptures all the way from Eve in the Garden of Eden. It was a topic for theologians and scholars, yet lay people were able to appreciate its depth and importance. Kang Goco, a resident, thanked the organizers of the event saying, "I found it very enlightening and informative," adding, "dinner was good too!"

Oh, yes, how can we gather without food for the tummy after feeding our souls? Neighbors and their friends bonded over a simple buffet of yummy pancit, embutido, chicken teriyaki, and lumpiang shanghai—with bottles of wine and lots of desserts, including Cara Mia cakes! It was truly a night that honored Mama Mary and Jesus with the community gathering as one big family.

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he Diocese of Cubao Migrants Ministry, with the participation of CTK-Greenmeadows Parish, visited Kaohsiung last March 2025 for an immersion with the Filipino migrants workers and church communities in the southern metropolitan port city of Taiwan. This is the first time the Philippine Catholic Church sent a mission of this kind overseas on the diocese level.

The Bishop of Cubao exhorts that this first overseas venture is a concrete expression of the diocese's commitment to the journey with God's people, experiencing the struggles and difficulties of our fellow Filipinos working abroad. It is a great opportunity for parish workers under the diocese to go deep into issues covered by the ministry so that programs and services are designed to address the concerns of our brethren migrants.

The Holy Father, in his 2024 World Day of Migrants and Refugees note, also highlighted the spirit of synodality - "God walks with His People", to give special attention to the plight of our migrant brothers and sisters.

The contingent gained meaningful insights and realizations from our Overseas Filipino Workers (OFW) in Taiwan, despite the short visit and hectic schedule. These can be used as inputs as we serve the OFW families in our Diocese and in the parish.

Some of the key concerns we gathered are:

- 1. Home-sickness / Separation from families and loved ones. This is a great sacrifice each OFW endures with long-distance relationship (LDRs), physical absence in the family and loved ones. Not a few of these LDRs lead to marital disputes and separation, unguided development of OFW children (addiction, early pregnancies & marriage, spoiled upbringing, etc.).
- 2. Money Matters with OFWs and families back home. The main reason for our OFWs in seeking job opportunities abroad is economics, i.e. to earn money to support and secure the future of the family. Time and again, this is also a main source of dispute for the OFW and the families left behind.

The OFW works hard to earn, but families left behind only has the appreciation that money comes very easy for the OFWs, a mindset which develops long term dependence on the OFW remittances. In one interview we have, the kabayan broached up this perennial concern within two minutes into the unprompted & spontaneous conversation, a revelation that this is a top-of-mind OFW concern through the years.

3. Physical difficulties and sacrifices. For many factory workers, living accommodations mean being billeted in van containers, with all the noise and intolerable temperatures (very hot in summer & very cold during winter). They also face at times tough supervisors and managers, and difficult work shift schedules. These are the sacrifices families at home does not realize their OFW breadwinner is enduring.

The OFW phenomenon has been happening for nearly two generations, but the same problems and concerns beset our kabayans and their families. It magnifies human weakness, if devoid of values education, guidance and community support. It is in this circumstance that our church can intervene and provide another layer of support to bring and animate Christian love to our marginalized OFW brethren and families.





SENIORS ON PILGRIMAGE

It all started when we found ourselves seated together in a dinner and started to reminisce about our activities as members of the Sunrise Ministry in the years before the pandemic. We specially recalled our pilgrimages to churches in Batangas and Manila and the funny and memorable incidents we shared that bound us together in friendship. Hence the idea of going on pilgrimage together in this Jubilee Year of Hope.

Immediately, a date was set, and plans were made to visit the Jubilee Churches of the Diocese of Antipolo. We would hire a coaster so that we could all be together. As we were all Senior Citizens and many of us had disabilities as well, we decided that this would only be the first leg of our pilgrimage – we would take it easy, visit only four churches, and take time to rest during lunch. We would have the rest of the year to visit the other churches.

We designed our schedule to make sure that we would have a chance to go to confession, hear mass and receive communion on the day - part of the requirements to obtain a plenary indulgence during the 2025 Jubilee Year. It was important to us to be spiritually ready. Some of us even went to confession before the day!

So, on Monday, March 24, 2025, we started to arrive in CTK as early as 7am – George and Baby Banal, Bon and Nina Intengan, Dan and Vinchu Lapid, Doy and Estrelle Lopez, Louie and Nel Laudico, Pepe and Billie Pilar, Lulay de la Cruz and companion, and Manolo Dayrit. Unfortunately, Anna Lagman couldn't make it.

Armed with our Pilgrims Passports, printed out Itineraries, and lots of food and drink, we set off for the first leg of our pilgrimage to Jubilee Churches in the Diocese of Antipolo. Our first stop was at the Diocesan Shrine of St. Therese of the Child Jesus. Here, we stood in a circle around the Baptismal Font and renewed our Baptismal Vows. After praying the Jubilee Prayer together in front of the Jubilee cross, we experience the first-class relics of St. Therese of Lisieux (a bone fragment), and her parents St. Louie and St. Zellie Martin.

Next stop was at the National Shrine of Our Lady of Peace and Good Voyage, also known as the Antipolo Cathedral, where we participated in the 9am Eucharistic Celebration. Some of us received the Sacrament of Reconciliation as well. We did not leave Antipolo until we were able to purchase the food and pasalubong the city is known for.

We prayed the rosary on our way to Mount Purro Nature Reserve where we were scheduled to have lunch. But when we got there, we forgot to be in pilgrimage mode for a while and feasted on the Filipino cuisine prepared for us by the owners, amidst fun and laughter and freshly brewed coffee.

We regretted having to leave this beautiful nature preserve but needed to keep scheduling. We were rewarded by our visit to the beautiful and historic Nuestra Señora de Annunciata Parish Church in BosoBoso. First established in 1669 by the Franciscans, passed on to the Jesuits in the mid 1700s, the parish is now managed by the Camillian fathers and has been fully restored. We lingered in this church longer than the others and took lots of pictures.

We were on our way to our last church when we hit 3 o'clock and prayed the Chaplet to Divine Mercy together. And by 4pm, we were at the Diocesan Shrine of Our Lady of the Abandoned. The church enshrines one of several images of the Madonna and Child venerated as miraculous, which received a Pontifical decree of coronation from Pope Benedict XVI in 2005.

We were hot and tired at the end of this pilgrimage, you'd think we'd want to go home, but we couldn't seem to part ways. So we ended the day at Rustic Mornings Café – a truly quaint place very near the church for more kuwentuhan and to make plans for the second leg of our 2025 Jubilee Pilgrimage, hoping to visit at least 10 of the 14 Jubilee Churches of the Diocese of Antipolo before the end of the year.

THE POWER OF THE UPPER ROOM

"It is in the silence of the 'upper room' of the heart that God speaks most intimately to us." – Thomas Merton

In the heart of Jerusalem, there is a sacred and storied place known as the Upper Room. It is a simple space, yet profoundly powerful—a room where the disciples gathered with Jesus for the Last Supper, where the Holy Spirit descended at Pentecost, and where the early Church, united in prayer, found strength, guidance, and renewal.

The Upper Room reminds us that prayer is not a side activity or a last resort; it is the lifeblood of a Christian community. It is where hearts are aligned with God's will, where courage is born, and where love takes root.

Recently, I had a moving encounter with one of our parishioners at the adoration chapel. She is a familiar face there, always quiet, always praying. One afternoon, I sat beside her and we talked. She pointed to the Eucharistic Lord and said with deep emotion, "Fr. Rex, do you know why I'm still alive? It's because of Him. I am a cancer survivor. I'm not afraid to die. But I pray because if I die, my children, my husband, and my elderly in-laws will suffer. God has given me a second life. I have a purpose to live."

Her faith reminded me of the disciples in the Upper Room—clinging to Jesus, not with fear, but with hope, trust, and a burning desire to live for others. Her story is one of many quiet miracles unfolding in the corners of our parish where prayer happens—where the Spirit moves unseen but powerfully.

We are all called to our own Upper Room moments.

When we pray as individuals, we open the door of our hearts to God. In solitude, we discover His voice, His peace,

and His direction. Like Thomas Merton said, it is in the inner silence that God speaks most intimately to us. In a noisy and distracted world, prayer becomes our sanctuary, our compass.

When we pray as families, we transform our homes into sanctuaries of grace. In the routine of life—meals, chores, school, work—it is easy to forget that we are a "domestic church." But when we gather even for a short time in prayer, God enters our homes in a special way. We model for our children that faith is not just for Sundays but for every moment of our lives.

And when we, as a CTK parish community, pray together—when we celebrate the Eucharist, adore the Blessed Sacrament, lift intentions for the sick, the struggling, and the grieving—something sacred happens. Just as the early Christians gathered in the Upper Room with "one heart and one mind," our unity in prayer brings spiritual power. The Holy Spirit descends. Courage is renewed. Healing flows. Lives are changed.

Christ the King Parish can become an Upper Room.

A place where prayer is alive.

A place where the Spirit is welcome.

A place where bold witnesses for Christ are born.

Let's make that vision real. Let our adoration chapel not be a silent corner but a heartbeat of our community. Let our family dinners be touched by Thanksgiving. Let every ministry, meeting, and Mass be soaked in prayer.

The great Christian philosopher Soren Kierkegaard once said, "Prayer does not change God, but it changes the one who prays." In the Upper Room, it changed the disciples. In our time, it is changing hearts right here in our parish—one prayer at a time.

May each of us find our own Upper Room. And may we, together, lift this parish to God in prayer—faithful, fervent, and full of hope.

Let us begin again, on our knees.

Let us begin in the power of prayer.

Let us begin in the Upper Room.

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OLPH VICARIATE SHARES RESULTS OF "LISTENING"

hree years after it was launched, the 16th Ordinary Assembly of the Synod officially concluded on October 27, 2024, with the celebration of Holy Mass in St. Peter's Basilica presided by the now deceased Pope Francis.

The assembly focused on the theme, "For a synodal Church: communion, participation and mission." The final document of the synod showed the results of a three-year journey of listening and dialogue and presented as a "threefold gift".

Over in the Philippines, the local Church, including the Cubao Diocese actively participated in the process. It also marked significant changes including the appointment of a new bishop for the Cubao Diocese in the person of a Claretian missionary, the Most Reverend Bishop Elisa Ayuban Jr.

On Friday, May 16, 2025, the Vicariate of Our Lady of Perpetual Help with its Vicar Forane Fr. Aytoy Opiniano and host OLPH's Fr. Ronnie Santos along with Vicar Forane Fr. Frederick "Jojo" Simon led the first Vicariate Meeting in order to share the results of the 3-year listening and dialogue among the parishes of the Vicariate — Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Cubao, Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal in Project 4, Christ the King Greenmeadows, Nativity of Our Lord, Transfiguration of Our Lord, San Roque Bagumbayan and St. John Paul II Eastwood.

CTK PPC Coordinator Albert Cuadrante presented the results of CTK's "listening" dialogues that were consolidated during the Parish Pastoral Council Meeting held earlier this year. Following the template of Leadership, Presence and Evangelization, Cuadrante noted that volunteer burnout, and insufficient support to ministries hamper the development of leaders in the parish. The lack of transparency in financial matters also clouds the positive image and hinders the strong presence of the parish in community life. Another concern was the lack of communication or misinformation on clergy matters. While most evangelization efforts among ministries

are largely productive, there was a marked lack of youth engagement in the parish.

To address these concerns, Cuadrante presented the recommendations culled from the listening activities among ministry members. Among these are the formulation of programs that will highlight the spirituality of service and formation to boost and unravel more parish servant leaders. To improve financial transparency, the parish fully supports the creation of the Parish Finance Council as part of the Diocese' Finance Council. There is also a need for quick, regular and timely reports of donations for a slew of causes. Finally, there is a clamor to adapt and implement tested programs to revitalize youth participation in parish life as part of the evangelization thrust.

It is heartening to note that even after the passing of our beloved Pope Francis, his initiative for synodal dialogue and listening is alive and present in the Cubao Diocese, particularly in the Vicariate of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. We fondly remember the late pontiff's exhortation, "we need to practice listening, in order to be able to respond to the Word that each day says – affirm your brothers and sisters – feed my sheep."

The Bible study is followed by a potluck merienda cena, a shared meal that strengthens the sense of family and community among participants. Homemade dishes, heartfelt conversations, and the simple joy of breaking bread together foster a spirit of inclusivity and shared purpose.

The BEC in Greenmeadows is a living example of Church at the grassroots—where faith is practiced not just in formal worship but in everyday relationships and shared experiences. Through its regular gatherings and special events, the community continues to grow as a circle of friends who pray, serve, and journey together in faith.

ovo Concertante Manila dreamed of joining the 70th International Choral Contest of Habanera and Polyphony in Torrevieja, Spain to mark our 25th anniversary as a choir with the able leadership of conductor and founder, Dr. Arwin Tan, who is also the Music Coordinator of Christ the King Church in Greenmeadows.

The competition required only five songs (one obligatory habanera, two choice habanera pieces, and two polyphonic pieces), the weeklong schedule fit well amongst the educators and students among the members, and the weather and location was beautiful this time of the year. Torrevieja also had much meaning for us, having won the First Prize in 2009 for the Polyphony Category in the 55th Certamen Internacional de Habaneras y Polifonía.

Beatrice Ramirez de Cartagena, one of our sopranos, shares, "What started out as wishful thinking post-pandemic, turned into what is probably the most meaningful and memorable experience I've had with Novo thus far, and the most emotional." It was an emotional journey because our preparation was riddled with challenges. While twenty-five of us prepared to travel to Spain, eight of us or ½ of the choir did not receive the visas they needed to travel. The choir made the difficult decision to carry on despite having only 16 singers. The competing choirs were mostly comprised of 24-40 members and it was reminiscent of David's plight against Goliath.

Ever a man of profound faith, Sir Arwin always reminded us that winning the prize should never be our ultimate goal but to give glory and honor to the Giver of our gift of song by helping our audience hear God's divine music through our singing.

Choirs hailed from as far as China, Indonesia, Serbia, Ukraine, Venezuela, Colombia, Belarus, Mexico, the Philippines and Spain to show their interpretations of habaneras and polyphonic. Victoria Suarez, one of our new altos, described our days in Torrevieja as, "a week filled with breathtaking sunrises and moonlit nights on the mediterranean beach, camaraderie, new friends, and glorifying God through beautiful songs."

It was a joy and an honor to be among the eight competing choirs selected to sing that evening and be awarded a Gold diploma for reaching the high standard imposed by the competition organizers. Novo also received the 3rd Prize in the 'Habaneras' category. In the end, the Habaneras category 1st Prize went to Coro de cámara del departamento de música de la Universidad de Guadalajara (Mexico) and the Polyphony category 1st Prize went to Telkom University Choir (Indonesia).

We could not have accomplished this feat if not for Sir Arwin. Yazmin Tolentino, our soprano, writes: "We are so blessed to witness and learn from the leadership of Sir Arwin whose guidance goes beyond music and anchors us deeper in faith." Maria Carmela Pabalan adds, "we came back with stronger faith and awe at the grace given to us, the gifts of old and new friendships, and memories we can cherish and hold dear always." Indeed, as our last song in the competition says, "some trust in horses, some trust in chariots, but we trust in the name of the Lord" who will "give you the desires of your heart and make all your plans succeed."

We thank all of you who supported us in our quest to glorify God through our voices in Torrevieja, Spain - our family and friends, those who donated towards our travel expenses, attended our concerts, and gave us the moral, psychological and spiritual support we needed to overcome many hurdles. May God give you the desire of your heart!



As one of the chosen apostles, I am proud to say that this opportunity spiritually touched my life. I heard the Gospel very clearly and awakened me for the first time. I realized that I was hopelessly lost, spiritually. I realized years later that God had protected me from such risky behavior. The moment I responded by putting my faith in Jesus Christ by dedicating myself an apostle, I was born again.

I grew up in a church-going family. I've always believed in God. However, I never heard the Gospel preached in such a way that I could understand how to begin this relationship with Jesus Christ. And yet, God was working in me, and was paving the way towards faith in Him.

The influential part during the Holy for me was the transition from Jesus' burial on Holy Saturday to the lighting of the Paschal candle at the Easter Vigil.

It's a story of profound suffering, but also of profound hope and redemption. 




